State sovereignty impacted by federal actions.

## A JOINT RESOLUTION

for

A JOINT RESOLUTION requesting the federal government to 1 2 respect state sovereignty; to review and correct federal 3 actions which infringe upon the right to bear arms; and to 4 recognize the impact of federal land use and natural resource 5 development policies on Wyoming citizens and to collaborate with the state in adopting and implementing the policies. б 7 8 WHEREAS, a union of sovereign states established a federal government and delegated limited powers upon that government; 9 10 11 WHEREAS, any question as to whether powers not delegated to 12 the federal government were retained by the states was 13 emphatically answered with the ratification of the tenth 14 amendment;

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2 WHEREAS, Wyoming is a sovereign state admitted to the union 3 on an equal footing, in all respects, in accordance with Wyoming's Act of Admission; 4 5 6 WHEREAS, the United States supreme court has consistently 7 affirmed that the power of Congress to admit new states, is limited as the "Union of States, must be equal in power, 8 9 dignity and authority, each state competent to exert that residuum of sovereignty not delegated to the United States by 10 11 the Constitution itself." Coyle v. Smith, 221 U.S. 559 12 (1911); 13 14 WHEREAS, the second amendment to the federal Constitution recognizes the right of the people to bear arms and that the 15

16 right shall not be infringed, and Article 1, Section 24 of 17 the Wyoming Constitution provides that the right of citizens 18 to bear arms in defense of themselves and of the state shall 19 not be denied;

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21 WHEREAS, Wyoming has been blessed with abundant natural 22 resources which have been developed to create economic 23 prosperity and provide energy independence from foreign

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1	nations thereby providing for the peace, safety and happiness
2	of all citizens of the United States;
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4	WHEREAS, the federal government has recently taken actions
5	limiting the development of natural resources, in many
6	instances unilaterally through the executive department,
7	without consultation with Congress or the States;
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9	WHEREAS, the federal government through Congressional
10	enactments, executive orders, agency regulations and judicial
11	rulings have limited the transfer and ownership of firearms
12	and have provided for the tracking of firearms, which are
13	actions infringing upon the people's rights;
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15	WHEREAS, federal laws enacted in accordance with the limited
16	powers delegated by the union of states to the federal
17	government are the supreme law of the land as recognized by
18	the United States and Wyoming Constitutions;
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20	WHEREAS, the state of Wyoming is an inseparable part of the
21	federal union;

1	WHEREAS, a more perfect union will not be realized by actions
2	of any single department of the federal government, cannot be
3	forged by acts of a federal government which exceed delegated
4	powers, and should not be tolerated when exercise of those
5	delegated powers harm the welfare of the citizens of states,
6	even when in complete observance of constitutional
7	limitations; and
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9	WHEREAS, all power is inherent in the people and all free
10	governments are founded on their authority.
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12	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MEMBERS OF THE

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5 Section 3. That the current Executive Department Administration should respect the critical role that federal 6 7 lands play in Wyoming's culture, recreation, wildlife, livestock production, mineral development and tourism, and 8 9 the current Administration and Congress work with the state 10 of Wyoming to develop federal policies land use policies in 11 a manner which recognizes their impacts on Wyoming citizens 12 and implements those policies in a manner consistent with the 13 state's culture.

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15 Section 4. That the Secretary of State of Wyoming 16 transmit copies of this resolution to the President of the 17 United States, to the President of the Senate and the Speaker 18 of the House of Representatives of the United States Congress 19 and to the Wyoming Congressional Delegation.
