Medical malpractice insurance study.

A BILL

for

1 AN ACT relating to insurance; requiring the insurance
2 commissioner to conduct a study to establish a joint
3 underwriting association for purposes of providing medical
4 malpractice insurance; imposing reporting requirements;
5 providing an appropriation; and providing for an effective
6 date.

8 *Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:*

10 **Section 1.**

11

12 (a) The Wyoming insurance commissioner shall conduct
13 a study on the feasibility of establishing a joint
14 underwriting association comprised of all insurers
15 authorized to underwrite casualty insurance in Wyoming for
16 purposes of providing medical liability insurance on a
17 self-supporting basis. The study shall investigate the

1 impact of the association upon the current market for
2 medical liability insurance, shall review rate and reserve
3 fund requirements necessary for association solvency and
4 shall evaluate necessary policyholder participation
5 requirements.

6

7 (b) On or before October 15, 2003, the insurance
8 commissioner shall report study findings to the joint
9 corporations, elections and political subdivisions interim
10 committee and the joint labor, health and social services
11 interim committee. The report shall include recommendations
12 on the feasibility of establishing a joint underwriting
13 association in Wyoming for purposes of providing medical
14 liability insurance.

15

16 **Section 2.** Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00)
17 is appropriated from the general fund to the Wyoming
18 insurance commissioner for purposes of conducting the study
19 required under section 1 of this act. Funds appropriated
20 under this section shall fund necessary actuarial
21 assistance and other administrative expenses necessary to
22 support study efforts.

1 **Section 3.** This act is effective immediately upon
2 completion of all acts necessary for a bill to become law
3 as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of the Wyoming
4 Constitution.
