A BILL

for

1 AN ACT relating to juveniles; amending provisions relating
2 to the Uniform Parentage Act, paternity establishment,
3 genetic testing, assisted reproduction; conforming
4 provisions; specifying applicability of paternity
5 proceedings prior to the effective date of the act; and
6 providing for an effective date.

7

8 *Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:*

9

10 **Section 1.** W.S. 14-2-401 through 14-2-408, 14-2-501
11 through 14-2-504, 14-2-601 through 14-2-614, 14-2-701
12 through 14-2-710, 14-2-801 through 14-2-823 and 14-2-901
13 through 14-2-907 are created to read:

ARTICLE 4

16

GENERAL PROVISIONS

17

1 **14-2-401. Short title.**

2

3 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Wyoming
4 Parentage Act.

5

6 **14-2-402. Definitions.**

7

8 (a) As used in this act:

9

10 (i) "Acknowledged father" means a man who has
11 established a father-child relationship under article 6 of
12 this act;

13

14 (ii) "Adjudicated father" means a man who has
15 been adjudicated by a court of competent jurisdiction to be
16 the father of a child;

17

18 (iii) "Alleged father" means a man who alleges
19 himself to be, or is alleged to be, the genetic father or a
20 possible genetic father of a child, but whose paternity has
21 not been determined. The term does not include:

22

23 (A) A presumed father;

1

2

(B) A man whose parental rights have been terminated or declared not to exist; or

4

5

(C) A male donor.

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7

(iv) "Assisted reproduction" means a method of causing pregnancy other than through sexual intercourse.

9

The term includes:

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11

(A) Intrauterine insemination;

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13

(B) Donation of eggs;

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15

(C) Donation of embryos;

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17

(D) In-vitro fertilization and transfer of embryos; and

19

20

(E) Intracytoplasmic sperm injection.

21

22

(v) "Child" means an individual of any age whose parentage may be determined under this act;

23

1

2 (vi) "Commence" means to file the initial
3 pleading seeking an adjudication of parentage in a district
4 court of this state;

5

6 (vii) "Determination of parentage" means the
7 establishment of the parent-child relationship by the
8 signing of a valid acknowledgment of paternity under
9 article 5 of this act or by adjudication by the court;

10

11 (viii) "Donor" means an individual who produces
12 eggs or sperm used for assisted reproduction, whether or
13 not for consideration. The term does not include:

14

15 (A) A husband who provides sperm, or a wife
16 who provides eggs, to be used for assisted reproduction by
17 the wife;

18

19 (B) A woman who gives birth to a child by
20 means of assisted reproduction;

21

22 (C) A parent under article 9 of this
23 chapter.

1

2 (ix) "Ethnic or racial group" means, for purposes
3 of genetic testing, a recognized group that an individual
4 identifies as all or part of the individual's ancestry or
5 that is so identified by other information;

6

7 (x) "Genetic testing" means an analysis of
8 genetic markers to exclude or identify a man as the father
9 or a woman as the mother of a child. The term includes an
10 analysis of one (1) or a combination of the following:

11

12 (A) Deoxyribonucleic acid; and

13

14 (B) Blood-group antigens, red-cell antigens,
15 human-leukocyte antigens, serum enzymes, serum proteins or
16 red-cell enzymes.

17

18 (xi) "Man" means a male individual of any age;

19

20 (xii) "Parent" means an individual who has
21 established a parent-child relationship under W.S.
22 14-2-501;

23

1 (xiii) "Parent-child relationship" means the
2 legal relationship between a child and a parent of the
3 child. The term includes the mother-child relationship and
4 the father-child relationship;

5

6 (xiv) "Paternity index" means the likelihood of
7 paternity calculated by computing the ratio between:

8

9 (A) The likelihood that the tested man is
10 the father, based on the genetic markers of the tested man,
11 mother and child, conditioned on the hypothesis that the
12 tested man is the father of the child; and

13

14 (B) The likelihood that the tested man is
15 not the father, based on the genetic markers of the tested
16 man, mother and child, conditioned on the hypothesis that
17 the tested man is not the father of the child and that the
18 father is of the same ethnic or racial group as the tested
19 man.

20

21 (xv) "Presumed father" means a man who, by
22 operation of law under W.S. 14-2-504, is recognized as the

1 father of a child until that status is rebutted or
2 confirmed in a judicial proceeding;

3

4 (xvi) "Probability of paternity" means the
5 measure, for the ethnic or racial group to which the
6 alleged father belongs, of the probability that the man in
7 question is the father of the child, compared with a
8 random, unrelated man of the same ethnic or racial group,
9 expressed as a percentage incorporating the paternity index
10 and a prior probability;

11

12 (xvii) "Record" means information that is
13 inscribed on a tangible medium or that is stored in an
14 electronic or other medium and is retrievable in
15 perceivable form;

16

17 (xviii) "Signatory" means an individual who
18 authenticates a record and is bound by its terms;

19

20 (xix) "State" means a state of the United States,
21 the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the United States
22 Virgin Islands or any territory or insular possession
23 subject to the jurisdiction of the United States;

1

2 (xx) "Title IV-D" means Title IV-D of the federal

3 Social Security Act;

4

5 (xxi) "This act" means W.S. 14-2-401 through

6 14-2-907.

7

8 **14-2-403. Scope of act; choice of law.**

9

10 (a) This act applies to every determination of
11 parentage in this state.

12

13 (b) The court shall apply the law of this state to
14 adjudicate the parent-child relationship. The applicable
15 law does not depend on:

16

17 (i) The place of birth of the child; or

18

19 (ii) The past or present residence of the child.

20

21 (c) This act does not create, enlarge or diminish
22 parental rights or duties under other law of this state.

23

1 (d) This act does not authorize or prohibit an
2 agreement between a woman and a man and another woman in
3 which the woman relinquishes all rights as a parent of a
4 child conceived by means of assisted reproduction, and
5 which provides that the man and the other woman become the
6 parents of the child. If a birth results under such an
7 agreement and the agreement is unenforceable under Wyoming
8 law, the parent-child relationship is determined as
9 provided in article 4 of this act.

10

11 **14-2-404. Court of this state.**

12

13 The district court is authorized to adjudicate parentage
14 under this act.

15

16 **14-2-405. Protection of participants.**

17

18 Proceedings under this act are subject to other law of this
19 state governing the health, safety, privacy and liberty of
20 a child or other individual who could be jeopardized by
21 disclosure of identifying information, including address,
22 telephone number, place of employment, social security
23 number and the child's day-care facility and school.

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2 **14-2-406. Determination of maternity.**

3

4 Provisions of this act relating to determination of
5 paternity apply to determinations of maternity.

6

7 **14-2-407. Severability clause.**

8

9 If any provision of this act or its application to an
10 individual or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity
11 does not affect other provisions or applications of this
12 act which can be given effect without the invalid provision
13 or application, and to this end the provisions of this act
14 are severable.

15

16 **14-2-408. Free transcript for appeal.**

17

18 If a party is financially unable to pay the cost of a
19 transcript, the court shall furnish on request a transcript
20 for purposes of appeal under this act.

21

ARTICLE 5

23

PARENT-CHILD RELATIONSHIP

1

2 **14-2-501. Establishment of parent-child relationship.**

3

4 (a) The mother-child relationship is established
5 between a woman and a child by:

6

7 (i) The woman's having given birth to the child;

8

9 (ii) An adjudication of the woman's maternity;

10 or

11

12 (iii) Adoption of the child by the woman.

13

14 (b) The father-child relationship is established
15 between a man and a child by:

16

17 (i) An unrebutted presumption of the man's
18 paternity of the child under W.S. 14-2-504;

19

20 (ii) An effective acknowledgment of paternity by
21 the man under article 6 of this act, unless the
22 acknowledgment has been rescinded or successfully
23 challenged;

1

2 (iii) An adjudication of the man's paternity;

3

4 (iv) Adoption of the child by the man; or

5

6 (v) The man's having consented to assisted
7 reproduction by his wife under article 8 of this act which
8 resulted in the birth of the child.

9

10 **14-2-502. No discrimination based on marital status.**

11

12 A child born to parents who are not married to each other
13 has the same rights under the law as a child born to
14 parents who are married to each other.

15

16 **14-2-503. Consequences of establishment of parentage.**

17

18 Unless parental rights are terminated, a parent-child
19 relationship established under this act applies for all
20 purposes, except as otherwise specifically provided by
21 other law of this state.

22

1 **14-2-504. Presumption of paternity in context of**
2 **marriage.**

3
4 (a) A man is presumed to be the father of a child if:

5
6 (i) He and the mother of the child are married
7 to each other and the child is born during the marriage;

8
9 (ii) He and the mother of the child were married
10 to each other and the child is born within three hundred
11 (300) days after the marriage is terminated by death,
12 annulment, declaration of invalidity, divorce or after the
13 entry of a decree of separation;

14
15 (iii) Before the birth of the child, he and the
16 mother of the child married each other in apparent
17 compliance with law, even if the attempted marriage is or
18 could be declared invalid, and the child is born during the
19 invalid marriage or within three hundred (300) days after
20 its termination by death, annulment, declaration of
21 invalidity, divorce or after the entry of a decree of
22 separation;

23

1 (iv) After the birth of the child, he and the
2 mother of the child married each other in apparent
3 compliance with law, whether or not the marriage is or
4 could be declared invalid, and he voluntarily asserted his
5 paternity of the child, and:

6

7 (A) The assertion is in a record filed with
8 the state office of vital records;

9

10 (B) He agreed to be and is named as the
11 child's father on the child's birth certificate; or

12

13 (C) He promised in a record to support the
14 child as his own.

15

16 (v) For the first two (2) years of the child's
17 life, he resided in the same household with the child and
18 openly held out the child as his own.

19

20 (b) A presumption of paternity established under this
21 section may be rebutted only by an adjudication under
22 article 8 of this act.

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ARTICLE 6

VOLUNTARY ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF PATERNITY

14-2-601. Acknowledgment of paternity.

(a) The mother of a child and a man claiming to be the genetic father of the child may sign an acknowledgment of paternity with intent to establish the man's paternity.

(b) An acknowledgment of paternity of a child born in Wyoming may be filed with the state office of vital records.

14-2-602. Execution of acknowledgment of paternity.

(a) An acknowledgment of paternity shall:

(i) Be in a record;

(ii) Be signed, or otherwise authenticated, under penalty for false swearing by the mother and by the man seeking to establish his paternity;

1 (iii) State that the child whose paternity is
2 being acknowledged:

3

4 (A) Does not have a presumed father, or has
5 a presumed father whose full name is stated; and

6

7 (B) Does not have another acknowledged or
8 adjudicated father.

9

10 (iv) State whether there has been genetic
11 testing and, if so, that the acknowledging man's claim of
12 paternity is consistent with the results of the testing;
13 and

14

15 (v) State that the signatories understand that
16 the acknowledgment is the equivalent of a judicial
17 adjudication of paternity of the child and that a challenge
18 to the acknowledgment is permitted only under limited
19 circumstances and is barred after two (2) years.

20

21 (b) An acknowledgment of paternity is void if it:

22

1 (i) States that another man is a presumed father,
2 unless a denial of paternity signed or otherwise
3 authenticated by the presumed father or a court order
4 rebutting the presumption is filed with the state office of
5 vital records;

6

7 (ii) States that another man is an acknowledged
8 or adjudicated father; or

9

10 (iii) Falsely denies the existence of a
11 presumed, acknowledged or adjudicated father of the child.

12

13 (c) A presumed father may sign or otherwise
14 authenticate an acknowledgment of paternity.

15

16 **14-2-603. Denial of paternity.**

17

18 (a) A presumed father may sign a denial of his
19 paternity. The denial is valid only if:

20

21 (i) An acknowledgment of paternity signed, or
22 otherwise authenticated, by another man is filed pursuant
23 to W.S. 14-2-605;

1

2 (ii) The denial is in a record, and is signed,
3 or otherwise authenticated, under penalty of perjury; and

4

5 (iii) The presumed father has not previously:

6

7 (A) Acknowledged his paternity, unless the
8 previous acknowledgment has been rescinded pursuant to W.S.
9 14-2-607 or successfully challenged pursuant to W.S.
10 14-2-608; or

11

12 (B) Been adjudicated to be the father of
13 the child.

14

15 **14-2-604. Rules for acknowledgment and denial of**
16 **paternity.**

17

18 (a) An acknowledgment of paternity and a denial of
19 paternity may be contained in a single document or may be
20 signed in counterparts, and may be filed separately or
21 simultaneously. If the acknowledgement and denial are both
22 necessary, neither is valid until both are filed.

23

1 (b) An acknowledgment of paternity or a denial of
2 paternity may be signed before the birth of the child.

3

4 (c) Subject to subsection (a) of this section, an
5 acknowledgment of paternity or denial of paternity takes
6 effect on the birth of the child or the filing of the
7 document with the state office of vital records, whichever
8 occurs later.

9

10 (d) An acknowledgment of paternity or denial of
11 paternity signed by a minor and a legal guardian of the
12 minor is valid if it is otherwise in compliance with this
13 act.

14

15 **14-2-605. Effect of acknowledgment or denial of**
16 **paternity.**

17

18 (a) Except as otherwise provided in W.S. 14-2-607 and
19 14-2-608, a valid acknowledgment of paternity filed with
20 the state office of vital records is equivalent to an
21 adjudication of paternity of a child and confers upon the
22 acknowledged father all of the rights and duties of a
23 parent.

1

2 (b) Except as otherwise provided in W.S. 14-2-607 and
3 14-2-608, a valid denial of paternity by a presumed father
4 filed with the state office of vital records in conjunction
5 with a valid acknowledgment of paternity is equivalent to
6 an adjudication of the nonpaternity of the presumed father
7 and discharges the presumed father from all rights and
8 duties of a parent.

9

10 **14-2-606. No filing fee.**

11

12 The state office of vital records shall not charge for
13 filing an acknowledgment of paternity or denial of
14 paternity.

15

16 **14-2-607. Proceeding for rescission.**

17

18 (a) A signatory may rescind an acknowledgment of
19 paternity or denial of paternity by commencing a proceeding
20 to rescind before the earlier of:

21

1 (i) Sixty (60) days after the effective date of
2 the acknowledgment or denial, as provided in W.S. 14-2-604;
3 or

4

5 (ii) The date of the first hearing in a
6 proceeding to which the signatory is a party before a court
7 to adjudicate an issue relating to the child, including a
8 proceeding that establishes support.

9

10 **14-2-608. Challenge after expiration of period for**
11 **rescission.**

12

13 (a) After the period for rescission under W.S.
14 14-2-607 has expired, a signatory of an acknowledgment of
15 paternity or denial of paternity may commence a proceeding
16 to challenge the acknowledgment or denial only:

17

18 (i) On the basis of fraud, duress or material
19 mistake of fact; and

20

21 (ii) Within two (2) years after the
22 acknowledgment or denial is filed with the state office of
23 vital records.

1

2 (b) A party challenging an acknowledgment of

3 paternity or denial of paternity has the burden of proof.

4

5 **14-2-609. Procedure for rescission or challenge.**

6

7 (a) Every signatory to an acknowledgment of paternity

8 and any related denial of paternity shall be made a party

9 to a proceeding to rescind or challenge the acknowledgment

10 or denial.

11

12 (b) For the purpose of rescission of, or challenge

13 to, an acknowledgment of paternity or denial of paternity,

14 a signatory submits to personal jurisdiction of this state

15 by signing the acknowledgment or denial, effective upon the

16 filing of the document with the state office of vital

17 records.

18

19 (c) Except for good cause shown, during the pendency

20 of a proceeding to rescind or challenge an acknowledgment

21 of paternity or denial of paternity, the court may not

22 suspend the legal responsibilities of a signatory arising

1 from the acknowledgment, including the duty to pay child
2 support.

3

4 (d) A proceeding to rescind or to challenge an
5 acknowledgment of paternity or denial of paternity shall be
6 conducted in the same manner as a proceeding to adjudicate
7 parentage under article 8 of this act.

8

9 (e) At the conclusion of a proceeding to rescind or
10 challenge an acknowledgment of paternity or denial of
11 paternity, the court shall order the state office of vital
12 records to amend the birth record of the child, if
13 appropriate.

14

15 **14-2-610. Ratification barred.**

16

17 A court or administrative agency conducting a judicial or
18 administrative proceeding is not required or permitted to
19 ratify an unchallenged acknowledgment of paternity.

20

21 **14-2-611. Full faith and credit.**

22

1 A court of this state shall give full faith and credit to
2 an acknowledgment of paternity or denial of paternity
3 effective in another state if the acknowledgment or denial
4 has been signed and is otherwise in compliance with the law
5 of the other state.

6

7 **14-2-612. Forms for acknowledgment and denial of**
8 **paternity.**

9

10 (a) To facilitate compliance with this article, the
11 state office of vital records shall prescribe forms for the
12 acknowledgment of paternity and the denial of paternity.

13

14 (b) A valid acknowledgment of paternity or denial of
15 paternity is not affected by a later modification of the
16 prescribed form.

17

18 (c) Every hospital or birthing center located in the
19 state shall provide to any person who holds himself out to
20 be the natural parent of a child born in the state an
21 affidavit of paternity pursuant to this act. The facility
22 providing the affidavit shall forward the completed
23 affidavit to the state office of vital records. Upon

1 request, the state office of vital records shall provide
2 blank affidavits of paternity to any facility making the
3 request under this subsection.

4

5 **14-2-613. Release of information.**

6

7 The state office of vital records may release information
8 relating to the acknowledgment of paternity or denial of
9 paternity to a signatory of the acknowledgment or denial,
10 to courts and to the Title IV-D agency of this or another
11 state.

12

13 **14-2-614. Adoption of rules.**

14

15 The state office of vital records may adopt rules to
16 implement this article.

17

18 **ARTICLE 7**

19 **GENETIC TESTING**

20

21 **14-2-701. Scope of article.**

22

1 (a) This article governs genetic testing of an
2 individual to determine parentage, whether the individual:

3

4 (i) Voluntarily submits to testing; or

5

6 (ii) Is tested pursuant to an order of the court
7 or a child support enforcement agency.

8

9 **14-2-702. Order for testing.**

10

11 (a) Except as otherwise provided in this article and
12 article 8 of this act, the court shall order the child and
13 other designated individuals to submit to genetic testing
14 if the request for testing is supported by the sworn
15 statement of a party to the proceeding:

16

17 (i) Alleging paternity and stating facts
18 establishing a reasonable probability of the requisite
19 sexual contact between the individuals; or

20

21 (ii) Denying paternity and stating facts
22 establishing a possibility that sexual contact between the

1 individuals, if any, did not result in the conception of
2 the child.

3

4 (b) A child support enforcement agency may order
5 genetic testing only if there is no presumed, acknowledged
6 or adjudicated father.

7

8 (c) If a request for genetic testing of a child is
9 made before birth, the court or child support enforcement
10 agency may not order in-utero testing.

11

12 (d) If two (2) or more men are subject to court-
13 ordered genetic testing, the testing may be ordered
14 concurrently or sequentially.

15

16 **14-2-703. Requirements for genetic testing.**

17

18 (a) Genetic testing shall be of a type reasonably
19 relied upon by experts in the field of genetic testing and
20 performed in a testing laboratory accredited by:

21

22 (i) The American Association of Blood Banks, or
23 a successor to its functions;

1

2 (ii) The American Society for Histocompatibility

3 and Immunogenetics, or a successor to its functions; or

4

5 (iii) An accrediting body designated by the

6 United States secretary of health and human services.

7

8 (b) A specimen used in genetic testing may consist of

9 one (1) or more samples, or a combination of samples, of

10 blood, buccal cells, bone, hair, or other body tissue or

11 fluid. The specimen used in the testing is not required to

12 be of the same kind for each individual undergoing genetic

13 testing.

14

15 (c) Based on the ethnic or racial group of an

16 individual, the testing laboratory shall determine the

17 databases from which to select frequencies for use in

18 calculation of the probability of paternity. If there is

19 disagreement as to the testing laboratory's choice, the

20 following rules apply:

21

22 (i) The individual objecting may require the

23 testing laboratory, within thirty (30) days after receipt

1 of the report of the test, to recalculate the probability
2 of paternity using an ethnic or racial group different from
3 that used by the laboratory.

4

5 (ii) The individual objecting to the testing
6 laboratory's initial choice shall:

7

8 (A) If the frequencies are not available to
9 the testing laboratory for the ethnic or racial group
10 requested, provide the requested frequencies compiled in a
11 manner recognized by accrediting bodies; or

12

13 (B) Engage another testing laboratory to
14 perform the calculations.

15

16 (iii) The testing laboratory may use its own
17 statistical estimate if there is a question regarding which
18 ethnic or racial group is appropriate. If available, the
19 testing laboratory shall calculate the frequencies using
20 statistics for any other ethnic or racial group requested.

21

22 (d) If, after recalculation using a different ethnic
23 or racial group, genetic testing does not rebuttably

1 identify a man as the father of a child under W.S.
2 14-2-605, an individual who has been tested may be required
3 to submit to additional genetic testing.

4

5 **14-2-704. Report of genetic testing.**

6

7 (a) A report of genetic testing shall be in a record
8 and signed under penalty of perjury by a designee of the
9 testing laboratory. A report made under the requirements of
10 this article is self-authenticating.

11

12 (b) Documentation from the testing laboratory of the
13 following information is sufficient to establish a reliable
14 chain of custody that allows the results of genetic testing
15 to be admissible without testimony:

16

17 (i) The names and photographs of the individuals
18 whose specimens have been taken;

19

20 (ii) The names of the individuals who collected
21 the specimens;

22

1 (iii) The places and dates the specimens were
2 collected;

3

4 (iv) The names of the individuals who received
5 the specimens in the testing laboratory; and

6

7 (v) The dates the specimens were received.

8

9 **14-2-705. Genetic testing results; rebuttal.**

10

11 (a) Under this act, a man is rebuttably identified as
12 the father of a child if the genetic testing complies with
13 this article and the results disclose that:

14

15 (i) The man has at least a ninety-nine percent
16 (99%) probability of paternity, using a prior probability
17 of one-half (1/2), as calculated by using the combined
18 paternity index obtained in the testing; and

19

20 (ii) A combined paternity index of at least one
21 hundred (100) to one (1).

22

1 (b) A man identified under subsection (a) of this
2 section as the father of the child may rebut the genetic
3 testing results only by other genetic testing satisfying
4 the requirements of this article which:

5
6 (i) Excludes the man as a genetic father of the
7 child; or

8
9 (ii) Identifies another man as the possible
10 father of the child.

11
12 (c) Except as otherwise provided in W.S. 14-2-710, if
13 more than one (1) man is identified by genetic testing as
14 the possible father of the child, the court shall order
15 them to submit to further genetic testing to identify the
16 genetic father.

17
18 **14-2-706. Costs of genetic testing.**

19
20 (a) Subject to assessment of costs under article 7 of
21 this act, the cost of initial genetic testing shall be
22 advanced:

23

1 (i) By a child support enforcement agency in a
2 proceeding in which the agency is providing services;

3

4 (ii) By the individual who made the request;

5

6 (iii) As agreed by the parties; or

7

8 (iv) As ordered by the court.

9

10 (b) In cases in which the cost is advanced by the
11 child support enforcement agency, the agency may seek
12 reimbursement from a man who is rebuttably identified as
13 the father.

14

15 **14-2-707. Additional genetic testing.**

16

17 The court or the child support enforcement agency shall
18 order additional genetic testing upon the request of a
19 party who contests the result of the original testing. If
20 the previous genetic testing identified a man as the father
21 of the child under W.S. 14-2-705, the court or agency may
22 not order additional testing unless the party provides
23 advance payment for the testing.

1

2 **14-2-708. Deceased individual.**

3

4 For good cause shown, the court may order genetic testing
5 of a deceased individual.

6

7 **14-2-709. Identical brothers.**

8

9 (a) The court may order genetic testing of a brother
10 of a man identified as the father of a child if the man is
11 commonly believed to have an identical brother and evidence
12 suggests that the brother may be the genetic father of the
13 child.

14

15 (b) If each brother satisfies the requirements as the
16 identified father of the child under W.S. 14-2-705 without
17 consideration of another identical brother being identified
18 as the father of the child, the court may rely on
19 nongenetic evidence to adjudicate which brother is the
20 father of the child.

21

22 **14-2-710. Confidentiality of genetic testing.**

1 (a) In all cases where paternity testing is
2 undertaken, all genetic information, including genetic
3 material and test results, shall be maintained only as long
4 as an accreditation body specified in W.S. 14-2-703
5 requires such materials to be maintained for accreditation
6 purposes. Thereafter, all materials shall be destroyed or
7 returned to the individual from whom the information was
8 obtained.

9

10 (b) No testing shall be conducted on any identifiable
11 genetic material for purposes other than paternity
12 determination without the written consent of the individual
13 from whom the genetic material is obtained.

14

15 (c) All information obtained from identifiable
16 genetic material submitted or used for determination of
17 paternity shall be confidential and used solely for the
18 purposes of determining paternity, unless individual
19 identifiers are removed from the data used for purposes
20 other than establishing paternity.

21

22 (d) For purposes of this section, "genetic
23 information" means any information about genes, gene

1 products or inherited characteristics that may derive from
2 the individual or a family member, including, but not
3 limited to, information:

4

5 (i) Regarding carrier status;

6

7 (ii) Regarding an increased likelihood of future
8 disease or increased sensitivity to any substance;

9

10 (iii) Derived from laboratory tests that
11 identify mutations in specific genes or chromosomes,
12 physical medical examinations, family histories, requests
13 for genetic services or counseling, tests of gene products
14 and direct analysis of genes or chromosomes.

15

16 (e) Release of any information obtained in paternity
17 testing without the written consent of the individual from
18 whom the genetic material is obtained to anyone not
19 directly involved in the paternity determination shall be a
20 misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punishable by a
21 fine of not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00),
22 imprisonment for not more than one (1) year, or both fine
23 and imprisonment.

1

2 (f) An individual who intentionally releases an
3 identifiable specimen of another individual for any purpose
4 other than that relevant to the proceeding regarding
5 parentage without a court order or the written permission
6 of the individual who furnished the specimen commits a
7 misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine
8 of not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00),
9 imprisonment for not more than one (1) year, or both fine
10 and imprisonment.

11

12

ARTICLE 8

13

PROCEEDING TO ADJUDICATE PARENTAGE

14

15

14-2-801. Proceeding authorized.

16

17 A civil proceeding may be maintained to adjudicate the
18 parentage of a child. The proceeding is governed by the
19 Wyoming Rules of Civil Procedure.

20

21

14-2-802. Standing to maintain proceeding.

22

1 (a) Subject to article 5 of this act and W.S.
2 14-2-807 and 14-2-809, a proceeding to adjudicate parentage
3 may be maintained by:

4
5 (i) The child;

6
7 (ii) The mother of the child;

8
9 (iii) A man whose paternity of the child is to
10 be adjudicated;

11
12 (iv) The child support enforcement agency;

13
14 (v) An authorized adoption agency or licensed
15 child-placing agency; or

16
17 (vi) A representative authorized by law to act
18 for an individual who would otherwise be entitled to
19 maintain a proceeding but who is deceased, incapacitated or
20 a minor.

21
22 **14-2-803. Parties to proceeding.**

23

1 (a) The following individuals shall be joined as
2 parties in a proceeding to adjudicate parentage:

3

4 (i) The mother of the child; and

5

6 (ii) A man whose paternity of the child is to be
7 adjudicated.

8

9 **14-2-804. Personal jurisdiction.**

10

11 (a) An individual may not be adjudicated to be a
12 parent unless the court has personal jurisdiction over the
13 individual.

14

15 (b) A court of this state having jurisdiction to
16 adjudicate parentage may exercise personal jurisdiction
17 over a nonresident individual, or the guardian or
18 conservator of the individual, if the conditions prescribed
19 in W.S. 20-4-142 are met.

20

21 (c) Lack of jurisdiction over one (1) individual does
22 not preclude the court from making an adjudication of

1 parentage binding on another individual over whom the court
2 has personal jurisdiction.

3

4 **14-2-805. Venue.**

5

6 (a) Venue for a proceeding to adjudicate parentage is
7 in the county of this state in which:

8

9 (i) The child resides or is found;

10

11 (ii) The respondent resides or is found if the
12 child does not reside in this state; or

13

14 (iii) A proceeding for probate or administration
15 of the presumed or alleged father's estate has been
16 commenced.

17

18 **14-2-806. No limitation; child having no presumed,
19 acknowledged or adjudicated father.**

20

21 (a) A proceeding to adjudicate the parentage of a
22 child having no presumed, acknowledged or adjudicated
23 father may be commenced at any time, even after:

1

2 (i) The child becomes an adult but only if the
3 child initiates the proceeding; or

4

5 (ii) An earlier proceeding to adjudicate
6 paternity has been dismissed based on the application of a
7 statute of limitation then in effect.

8

9 **14-2-807. Limitation; child having presumed father.**

10

11 (a) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (b) of
12 this section, a proceeding brought by a presumed father,
13 the mother, or another individual to adjudicate the
14 parentage of a child having a presumed father shall be
15 commenced within a reasonable time after obtaining
16 knowledge of relevant facts, but in no event later than
17 five (5) years after the child's birth.

18

19 (b) A proceeding seeking to disprove the father-child
20 relationship between a child and the child's presumed
21 father may be maintained at any time if the court
22 determines that:

23

1 (i) The presumed father and the mother of the
2 child neither cohabited nor engaged in sexual intercourse
3 with each other during the probable time of conception; and
4

5 (ii) The presumed father never openly held out
6 the child as his own.
7

8 **14-2-808. Authority to deny motion for genetic**
9 **testing.**

10

11 (a) In a proceeding to adjudicate the parentage of a
12 child having a presumed father or to challenge the
13 paternity of a child having an acknowledged father, the
14 court may deny a motion seeking an order for genetic
15 testing of the mother, the child and the presumed or
16 acknowledged father if the court determines that:

17

18 (i) The conduct of the mother or the presumed or
19 acknowledged father estops that party from denying
20 parentage; and

21

1 (ii) It would be inequitable to disprove the
2 father-child relationship between the child and the
3 presumed or acknowledged father.

4

5 (b) In determining whether to deny a motion seeking
6 an order for genetic testing under this section, the court
7 shall consider the best interest of the child, including
8 the following factors:

9

10 (i) The length of time between the proceeding to
11 adjudicate parentage and the time that the presumed or
12 acknowledged father was placed on notice that he might not
13 be the genetic father;

14

15 (ii) The length of time during which the
16 presumed or acknowledged father has assumed the role of
17 father of the child;

18

19 (iii) The facts surrounding the presumed or
20 acknowledged father's discovery of his possible
21 nonpaternity;

22

1 (iv) The nature of the relationship between the
2 child and the presumed or acknowledged father;

3

4 (v) The age of the child;

5

6 (vi) The harm that may result to the child if
7 presumed or acknowledged paternity is successfully
8 disproved;

9

10 (vii) The nature of the relationship between the
11 child and any alleged father;

12

13 (viii) The extent to which the passage of time
14 reduces the chances of establishing the paternity of
15 another man and a child support obligation in favor of the
16 child; and

17

18 (ix) Other factors that may affect the equities
19 arising from the disruption of the father-child
20 relationship between the child and the presumed or
21 acknowledged father or the chance of other harm to the
22 child.

23

1 (c) In a proceeding involving the application of this
2 section, a minor or incapacitated child shall be
3 represented by a guardian ad litem.

4

5 (d) Denial of a motion seeking an order for genetic
6 testing shall be based on clear and convincing evidence.

7

8 (e) If the court denies a motion seeking an order for
9 genetic testing, it shall issue an order adjudicating the
10 presumed father to be the father of the child.

11

12 **14-2-809. Limitation; child having acknowledged or**
13 **adjudicated father.**

14

15 (a) If a child has an acknowledged father, a
16 signatory to the acknowledgment of paternity or denial of
17 paternity may commence a proceeding seeking to rescind the
18 acknowledgement or denial or challenge the paternity of the
19 child only within the time allowed under W.S. 14-2-607 or
20 14-2-608.

21

22 (b) If a child has an acknowledged father or an
23 adjudicated father, an individual, other than the child,

1 who is neither a signatory to the acknowledgment of
2 paternity nor a party to the adjudication and who seeks an
3 adjudication of paternity of the child shall commence a
4 proceeding not later than two (2) years after the effective
5 date of the acknowledgment or adjudication.

6

7 (c) A proceeding under this section is subject to the
8 application of the principles of estoppel established under
9 W.S. 14-2-808.

10

11 **14-2-810. Joinder of proceedings.**

12

13 (a) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (b) of
14 this section, a proceeding to adjudicate parentage may be
15 joined with a proceeding for adoption, termination of
16 parental rights, child custody or visitation, child
17 support, divorce, annulment, legal separation or separate
18 maintenance, probate or administration of an estate or
19 other appropriate proceeding.

20

21 (b) A respondent may not join a proceeding described
22 in subsection (a) of this section with a proceeding to

1 adjudicate parentage brought under the Uniform Interstate
2 Family Support Act.

3

4 **14-2-811. Proceeding before birth.**

5

6 (a) A proceeding to determine parentage may be
7 commenced before the birth of the child, but may not be
8 concluded until after the birth of the child. The following
9 actions may be taken before the birth of the child:

10

11 (i) Service of process;

12

13 (ii) Discovery; and

14

15 (iii) Except as prohibited by W.S. 14-2-702,
16 collection of specimens for genetic testing.

17

18 **14-2-812. Child as party; representation.**

19

20 (a) A minor child is a permissible party, but is not
21 a necessary party to a proceeding under this article.

22

1 (b) The court shall appoint an attorney to represent
2 the best interest of a minor or incapacitated child if the
3 child is a party or the court finds that the interests of
4 the child are not adequately represented.

5
6 **14-2-813. Admissibility of results of genetic**
7 **testing; expenses.**

8
9 (a) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (c) of
10 this section, a record of a genetic testing expert is
11 admissible as evidence of the truth of the facts asserted
12 in the report unless a party objects to its admission
13 within fourteen (14) days after its receipt by the
14 objecting party and cites specific grounds for exclusion.
15 The admissibility of the report is not affected by whether
16 the testing was performed:

17
18 (i) Voluntarily or pursuant to an order of the
19 court or a child support enforcement agency; or

20
21 (ii) Before or after the commencement of the
22 proceeding.

23

1 (b) A party objecting to the results of genetic
2 testing may call one (1) or more genetic testing experts to
3 testify in person or by telephone, videoconference,
4 deposition or another method approved by the court. Unless
5 otherwise ordered by the court, the party offering the
6 testimony bears the expense for the expert testifying.

7

8 (c) If a child has a presumed, acknowledged or
9 adjudicated father, the results of genetic testing are
10 inadmissible to adjudicate parentage unless performed:

11

12 (i) With the consent of both the mother and the
13 presumed, acknowledged or adjudicated father; or

14

15 (ii) Pursuant to an order of the court under
16 W.S. 14-2-702.

17

18 (d) Copies of bills for genetic testing and for
19 prenatal and postnatal health care for the mother and child
20 which are furnished to the adverse party not less than ten
21 (10) days before the date of a hearing are admissible to
22 establish:

23

1 (i) The amount of the charges billed; and

2

3 (ii) That the charges were reasonable, necessary
4 and customary.

5

6 **14-2-814. Consequences of declining genetic testing.**

7

8 (a) A person who declines to comply with an order for
9 genetic testing is guilty of contempt of court.

10

11 (b) If an individual whose paternity is being
12 determined declines to submit to genetic testing ordered by
13 the court, the court for that reason may adjudicate
14 parentage contrary to the position of that individual.

15

16 (c) Genetic testing of the mother of a child is not a
17 condition precedent to testing the child and a man whose
18 paternity is being determined. If the mother is unavailable
19 or declines to submit to genetic testing, the court may
20 order the testing of the child and every man whose
21 paternity is being adjudicated.

22

23 **14-2-815. Admission of paternity authorized.**

1

2 (a) A respondent in a proceeding to adjudicate
3 parentage may admit to the paternity of a child by filing a
4 pleading to that effect or by admitting paternity under
5 penalty of perjury when making an appearance or during a
6 hearing.

7

8 (b) If the court finds that the admission of
9 paternity satisfies the requirements of this section and
10 finds that there is no reason to question the admission,
11 the court shall issue an order adjudicating the child to be
12 the child of the man admitting paternity.

13

14 **14-2-816. Temporary order.**

15

16 (a) In a proceeding under this article, the court
17 shall issue a temporary order for support of a child if the
18 order is appropriate and the individual ordered to pay
19 support is:

20

21 (i) A presumed father of the child;

22

1 (ii) Petitioning to have his paternity
2 adjudicated;

3
4 (iii) Identified as the father through genetic
5 testing under W.S. 14-2-705;

6
7 (iv) An alleged father who has declined to
8 submit to genetic testing;

9
10 (v) Shown by clear and convincing evidence to be
11 the father of the child; or

12
13 (vi) The mother of the child.

14
15 (b) A temporary order may include provisions for
16 custody and visitation as provided by other law of this
17 state.

18
19 **14-2-817. Rules for adjudication of paternity.**

20
21 (a) The court shall apply the following rules to
22 adjudicate the paternity of a child:

23

1 (i) The paternity of a child having a presumed,
2 acknowledged or adjudicated father may be disproved only by
3 admissible results of genetic testing excluding that man as
4 the father of the child or identifying another man as the
5 father of the child;

6
7 (ii) Unless the results of genetic testing are
8 admitted to rebut other results of genetic testing, a man
9 identified as the father of a child under W.S. 14-2-705
10 shall be adjudicated the father of the child;

11
12 (iii) If the court finds that genetic testing
13 under W.S. 14-2-705 neither identifies nor excludes a man
14 as the father of a child, the court may not dismiss the
15 proceeding. In that event, the results of genetic testing,
16 and other evidence, are admissible to adjudicate the issue
17 of paternity;

18
19 (iv) Unless the results of genetic testing are
20 admitted to rebut other results of genetic testing, a man
21 excluded as the father of a child by genetic testing shall
22 be adjudicated not to be the father of the child.

23

1 **14-2-818. Jury prohibited.**

2

3 The court, without a jury, shall adjudicate paternity of a
4 child.

5

6 **14-2-819. Hearings; inspection of records.**

7

8 Notwithstanding any other law concerning public hearings
9 and records, any hearing or trial held under this act shall
10 be held in closed court without admittance of any person
11 other than those necessary to the action or proceeding. All
12 papers and records other than the final judgment pertaining
13 to the action or proceeding, whether part of the permanent
14 record of the court or of a file in the state office of
15 vital records services or elsewhere, are subject to
16 inspection only by court order.

17

18 **14-2-820. Order on default.**

19

20 (a) The court shall issue an order adjudicating the
21 paternity of a man who:

22

23 (i) After service of process, is in default; and

1

2 (ii) Is found by the court to be the father of a
3 child.

4

5 **14-2-821. Dismissal for want of prosecution.**

6

7 The court may issue an order dismissing a proceeding
8 commenced under this act for want of prosecution only
9 without prejudice. An order of dismissal for want of
10 prosecution purportedly with prejudice is void and has only
11 the effect of a dismissal without prejudice.

12

13 **14-2-822. Order adjudicating parentage.**

14

15 (a) The court shall issue an order adjudicating
16 whether a man alleged or claiming to be the father is the
17 parent of the child.

18

19 (b) An order adjudicating parentage shall identify
20 the child by name and date of birth.

21

22 (c) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (d) of
23 this section, the court may assess filing fees, reasonable

1 attorney's fees, fees for genetic testing, necessary travel
2 and other reasonable expenses incurred in a proceeding
3 under this article. The court may award attorney's fees,
4 which may be paid directly to the attorney, who may enforce
5 the order in the attorney's own name.

6

7 (d) The court may not assess fees, costs or expenses
8 against the child support enforcement agency of this state
9 or another state, except as provided by other law.

10

11 (e) On request of a party and for good cause shown,
12 the court may order that the name of the child be changed.

13

14 (f) If the order of the court is at variance with the
15 child's birth certificate, the court shall order the state
16 office of vital records to issue an amended birth
17 certificate.

18

19 **14-2-823. Binding effect of determination of**
20 **parentage.**

21

22 (a) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (b) of
23 this section, a determination of parentage is binding on:

1

2 (i) All signatories to an acknowledgement or
3 denial of paternity as provided in article 5 of this act;
4 and

5

6 (ii) All parties to an adjudication by a court
7 acting under circumstances that satisfy the jurisdictional
8 requirements of W.S. 20-4-142.

9

10 (b) A child is not bound by a determination of
11 parentage under this act unless:

12

13 (i) The determination was based on an
14 unrescinded acknowledgment of paternity and the
15 acknowledgement is consistent with the results of genetic
16 testing;

17

18 (ii) The adjudication of parentage was based on
19 a finding consistent with the results of genetic testing
20 and the consistency is declared in the determination or is
21 otherwise shown; or

22

1 (iii) The child was a party or was represented
2 in the proceeding determining parentage by an attorney
3 representing the child's best interest.
4

5 (c) In a proceeding to dissolve a marriage, the court
6 is deemed to have made an adjudication of the parentage of
7 a child if the court acts under circumstances that satisfy
8 the jurisdictional requirements of W.S. 20-4-142, and the
9 final order:
10

11 (i) Expressly identifies a child as a "child of
12 the marriage," "issue of the marriage," or similar words
13 indicating that the husband is the father of the child; or
14

15 (ii) Provides for support of the child by the
16 husband unless paternity is specifically disclaimed in the
17 order.
18

19 (d) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (b) of
20 this section, a determination of parentage may be a defense
21 in a subsequent proceeding seeking to adjudicate parentage
22 by an individual who was not a party to the earlier
23 proceeding.

1

2 (e) A party to an adjudication of paternity may
3 challenge the adjudication only under the laws of this
4 state relating to appeal, vacation of judgments or other
5 judicial review.

6

7

ARTICLE 9

8

CHILD OF ASSISTED REPRODUCTION

9

10 **14-2-901. Scope of article.**

11

12 This article does not apply to the birth of a child
13 conceived by means of sexual intercourse.

14

15 **14-2-902. Parental status of donor.**

16

17 A donor is not a parent of a child conceived by means of
18 assisted reproduction.

19

20 **14-2-903. Paternity of child of assisted**
21 **reproduction.**

22

1 A man who provides sperm for, or consents to, assisted
2 reproduction by a woman as provided in W.S. 14-2-904, with
3 the intent to be the parent of her child, is the parent of
4 the resulting child.

5

6 **14-2-904. Consent to assisted reproduction.**

7

8 (a) Consent by a woman and a man who intends to be
9 the parent of a child born to the woman by assisted
10 reproduction shall be in a record signed by the woman and
11 the man. This requirement shall not apply to a donor.

12

13 (b) Failure to sign a consent required by subsection
14 (a) of this section, before or after birth of the child,
15 does not preclude a finding of paternity if the woman and
16 the man, during the first two (2) years of the child's life
17 resided together in the same household with the child and
18 openly held out the child as their own.

19

20 **14-2-905. Limitation on husband's dispute of**
21 **paternity.**

22

1 (a) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (b) of
2 this section, the husband of a wife who gives birth to a
3 child by means of assisted reproduction may not challenge
4 his paternity of the child unless:

5

6 (i) Within two (2) years after learning of the
7 birth of the child he commences a proceeding to adjudicate
8 his paternity; and

9

10 (ii) The court finds that he did not consent to
11 the assisted reproduction, before or after birth of the
12 child.

13

14 (b) A proceeding to adjudicate paternity may be
15 maintained at any time if the court determines that:

16

17 (i) The husband did not provide sperm for, or
18 before or after the birth of the child consent to, assisted
19 reproduction by his wife;

20

21 (ii) The husband and the mother of the child
22 have not cohabited since the probable time of assisted
23 reproduction; and

1

2 (iii) The husband never openly held out the
3 child as his own.

4

5 (c) The limitation provided in this section applies
6 to a marriage declared invalid after assisted reproduction.

7

8 **14-2-906. Effect of dissolution of marriage or**
9 **withdrawal of consent.**

10

11 (a) If a marriage is dissolved before placement of
12 eggs, sperm or embryos, the former spouse is not a parent
13 of the resulting child unless the former spouse consented
14 in a record that if assisted reproduction were to occur
15 after a divorce, the former spouse would be a parent of the
16 child.

17

18 (b) The consent of a woman or a man to assisted
19 reproduction may be withdrawn by that individual in a
20 record at any time before placement of eggs, sperm or
21 embryos. An individual who withdraws consent under this
22 section is not a parent of the resulting child.

23

1 **14-2-907. Parental status of deceased individual.**

2

3 If an individual who consented in a record to be a parent
4 by assisted reproduction dies before placement of eggs,
5 sperm or embryos, the deceased individual is not a parent
6 of the resulting child unless the deceased individual
7 consented in a record that if assisted reproduction were to
8 occur after death, the deceased individual would be a
9 parent of the child.

10

5 ~~20-2-113 or 20-4-120,~~ shall not bear interest.

6
7 **1-16-103. Penalty assessed on unpaid judgment by**
8 **operation of law.**

9
10 (a) As used in this section "judgment by operation of
11 law" means a periodic payment or installment for child
12 support or maintenance which is unpaid on the date due and
13 which has become a judgment by operation of law pursuant to
14 W.S. ~~14-2-113,~~ 14-2-204, ~~20-2-113 or 20-4-123.~~

15
16 **1-16-301. Judgments and orders to be entered in**
17 **journal; recordation where real property affected.**

18
19 (b) No entry will be made in the journal relating to
20 a judgment by operation of law arising under W.S. ~~14-2-113~~
21 ~~or~~ 14-2-204.

22
23 **1-16-307. Index to judgments.**

1

2 (b) No index shall be made of a judgment by operation
3 of law arising under W.S. ~~14-2-113 or~~ 14-2-204.

4

5 **1-16-308. Release of satisfied judgment; requirement.**

6

7 (b) Subsection (a) of this section does not apply to
8 judgments arising by operation of law under W.S. ~~14-2-113~~
9 ~~or~~ 14-2-204.

10

11 **1-16-309. Release of satisfied judgment; liability**
12 **for failure.**

13

14 (b) Subsection (a) of this section does not apply to
15 judgments by operation of law arising under W.S. ~~14-2-113,~~
16 ~~14-2-204, 20-2-113 or 20-4-123.~~

17

18 **2-4-107. Determination of relationship of parent and**
19 **child.**

20

21 (a) If for purposes of intestate succession, a
22 relationship of parent and child shall be established to
23 determine succession by, through or from a person:

1

2 (iii) In cases not covered by paragraph (i) of
3 this subsection, a person born out of wedlock is a child of
4 the mother. That person is also a child of the father, if
5 the relationship of parent and child has been established
6 under the Uniform Parentage Act, W.S. ~~14-2-101~~14-2-401
7 through ~~14-2-120~~14-2-907.

8

9 **14-3-402. Definitions.**

10

11 (a) As used in this act:

12

13 (xiii) "Parent" means either a natural or
