Source of revenue increase(decrease):

Licensing fee(s) for possible new permit, similar to what was created for immunizations that resulted from W.S. 33-24-157.

Assumptions:
Since we are assuming a new license would be created, we also assume an application and renewal fee would also be created. We are also assuming that this fee would be the same as the immunization license: \$10. The numbers here are based off of our records of the immunization license. For the first three years (2006-2009) pharmacists had limited interest in an immunizer license. By 2013, approximately $40 \%$ of the immunizer licenses had been issued. In 2014 that number increased to $60 \%$ and by 2016 87\% of the active immunizer licenses had been issued. This roughly corresponds with the time period that the University of Wyoming School of Pharmacy incorporated immunization training into their curriculum and when pharmacy interns became able to immunize. While initial revenue appears to be negligible, as of $12 / 31 / 19$ there are 646 active immunizer licenses accounting for $\$ 6,460.00$ in revenue from immunization licenses. Therefore, we believe that if a new license were to be created, it would pay for itself.
