A BILL

for

1 AN ACT relating to school finance; implementing
2 modifications to the Wyoming education resource block grant
3 model and other school finance components; codifying
4 previously uncodified law; amending related provisions;
5 repealing conflicting provisions; requiring a report;
6 requiring a study; and providing for effective dates.

7

8 *Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:*

9

10 **Section 1.** W.S. 21-13-309.1 is created to read:

11

12 **21-13-309.1. Education resource block grant model**
13 **components.**

14

1 (a) This section is intended to specify the education
2 resource block grant model components and computations
3 necessary to execute the 2020 cost of education study as
4 required by W.S. 21-13-309(t) and as adopted and modified
5 by the legislature.

6

7 (b) As used in this section:

8

9 (i) "Block grant model components" includes the
10 following categories:

11

12 (A) The educational materials category of
13 model components which includes the following:

14

15 (I) The books and instructional
16 materials component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxi) of
17 this section;

18

19 (II) The gifted and talented students
20 component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxiii) of this
21 section;

22

1 (III) The career and technical
2 education equipment and materials component resourced under
3 paragraph (c)(xxiv) of this section;

4

5 (IV) The student activities component
6 resourced under paragraph (c)(xxv) of this section;

7

8 (V) The professional development
9 component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxvi) of this
10 section;

11

12 (VI) The central office nonpersonnel
13 resources component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxviii)
14 of this section;

15

16 (VII) The operations and maintenance
17 supplies component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxx) of
18 this section.

19

20 (B) The energy category of model components
21 which includes the utilities component resourced under
22 paragraph (c)(xxxii) of this section;

23

1 (C) The nonprofessional labor category of
2 model components which includes supervisory aides, central
3 office classified staff, school secretaries, school
4 clerical staff, maintenance workers, groundskeepers and
5 custodians resourced under paragraph (c)(xxxiii) of this
6 section;

7

8 (D) The professional labor category of
9 model components which includes teachers, principals,
10 assistant principals, superintendents, assistant
11 superintendents, business managers and school computer
12 technicians resourced under paragraph (c)(xxxiii) of this
13 section.

14

15 (ii) "FTE" means the full-time equivalency basis
16 as computed in accordance with guidelines prescribed by
17 rule of the department of education;

18

19 (iii) "Grade band" means a school grade
20 configuration that falls within one (1) of the following
21 configurations:

22

1 (A) An elementary school grade band that
2 includes grades kindergarten (K) through grade six (6) or
3 any combination of those grades;

4

5 (B) A middle school grade band that
6 includes grade five (5) through eight (8) or grade six (6)
7 through grade nine (9) or any combination of grades within
8 those ranges;

9

10 (C) A high school grade band that includes
11 grade eight (8) through grade twelve (12) or any
12 combination of those grades.

13

14 (c) Except as provided in subsection (d) of this
15 section, the Wyoming education resource block grant model
16 components and the resourcing for those components shall be
17 as follows:

18

19 (i) Full day kindergarten. Funded for all
20 elementary schools;

21

1 (ii) Core teachers for schools with ADM greater
2 than forty-nine (49) and schools not designated as
3 alternative schools:

4

5 (A) Elementary school. Calculated as ADM
6 divided by seventeen (17);

7

8 (B) Middle school. Calculated as ADM
9 divided by twenty-two (22);

10

11 (C) High school. Calculated as ADM divided
12 by twenty-two (22).

13

14 (iii) Specialist teachers for schools with more
15 than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as
16 alternative schools:

17

18 (A) Elementary school specialist teachers
19 shall be calculated as twenty percent (20%) of the core
20 teachers in subparagraph (ii)(A) of this subsection;

21

1 (B) Middle school specialist teachers shall
2 be calculated as thirty-three percent (33%) of the core
3 teachers in subparagraph (ii)(B) of this subsection;

4

5 (C) High school specialist teachers shall
6 be calculated as thirty-three percent (33%) of the core
7 teachers in subparagraph (ii)(C) of this subsection.

8

9 (iv) Additional vocational education teachers.
10 For schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools
11 not designated as alternative schools, calculated as the
12 product of each high school's FTE vocational education
13 students reported under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(D)(I)
14 multiplied by twenty-nine hundredths (0.29) then divided by
15 the high school class size of twenty-two (22);

16

17 (v) Small school and alternative school core
18 staff. For schools with forty-nine (49) or less ADM or
19 alternative schools, provide one (1) teacher position for
20 every seven (7) ADM, calculated as total school ADM divided
21 by seven (7). Each school shall receive a minimum of one
22 (1) teacher by increasing the sum of the core staff in this
23 paragraph to one (1) if the total is less than one (1);

1

2

(vi) Minimum teachers:

3

4

(A) The minimum number of teachers for any elementary school with more than forty-nine (49) ADM is six (6), as calculated by increasing the sum of the core teachers in paragraph (ii) of this subsection and specialist teachers in paragraph (iii) of this subsection to six (6). The minimum number of teachers for any middle school with more than forty-nine (49) ADM is eight (8), as calculated by increasing the sum of the core teachers in paragraph (ii) of this subsection and specialist teachers in paragraph (iii) of this subsection to eight (8). The minimum number of teachers for any high school with more than forty-nine (49) ADM is ten (10), as calculated by increasing the sum of the core teachers in paragraph (ii) of this subsection, specialist teachers in paragraph (iii) of this subsection and additional vocational education teachers in paragraph (iv) of this subsection to ten (10). The minimum number of teachers under this subparagraph shall be provided for each elementary school, middle school and high school grade band for a school that contains more

1 than one (1) grade band and the grade band is more than
2 forty-nine (49) ADM;

3

4 (B) The minimum number of teachers for any
5 school with more than forty-nine (49) ADM, more than one
6 (1) grade band and at least one (1) grade band with
7 forty-nine (49) ADM or less shall be calculated as follows:

8

9 (I) For each grade band with
10 forty-nine (49) ADM or less, the minimum number of teachers
11 shall be calculated by increasing the sum of the core
12 teachers in paragraph (ii) of this subsection, specialist
13 teachers in paragraph (iii) of this subsection and
14 additional vocational education teachers in paragraph (iv)
15 of this subsection to one (1) teacher position for every
16 seven (7) ADM;

17

18 (II) For each grade band with more
19 than forty-nine (49) ADM, the minimum number of teachers
20 shall be calculated as provided in subparagraph (A) of this
21 paragraph.

22

1 (vii) Small school district teacher adjustment.
2 For all schools within a district comprised of less than
3 two hundred forty-three (243) total ADM and notwithstanding
4 all other teacher resources in paragraphs (ii) through (vi)
5 of this subsection, resource each school with a minimum of
6 one (1) core teacher at every grade level with reported
7 ADM, plus an additional twenty percent (20%) of elementary
8 grade level core teachers to calculate elementary
9 specialist teachers and an additional thirty-three percent
10 (33%) of middle school and high school grade core teachers
11 to calculate middle school and high school specialist
12 teachers;

13

14 (viii) Instructional coaches:

15

16 (A) Elementary school instructional coaches
17 shall be calculated as the product of the school's ADM
18 multiplied by forty-five hundredths (0.45) divided by two
19 hundred eighty-eight (288) for schools with more than
20 forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as
21 alternative schools;

22

1 (B) Middle and high school instructional
2 coaches shall be calculated as the product of the school's
3 ADM multiplied by forty-five hundredths (0.45) divided by
4 three hundred fifteen (315) for schools with more than
5 forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as
6 alternative schools;

7

8 (C) For schools containing more than one
9 (1) grade band and more than forty-nine (49) ADM,
10 instructional coaches shall be calculated as the product of
11 the school's total ADM multiplied by forty-five hundredths
12 (0.45) divided by three hundred fifteen (315).

13

14 (ix) Tutors:

15

16 (A) Calculated as the school's at-risk
17 students computed under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(A) divided by
18 one hundred (100) for schools with more than forty-nine
19 (49) ADM and schools not designated as alternative schools;

20

21 (B) Minimum tutors. A minimum number of
22 tutors shall be provided for schools with more than

1 forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as
2 alternative schools based upon the following:

3

4 (I) Elementary schools. If the amount
5 calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph is less
6 than the school ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight
7 (288), then increase the amount calculated under
8 subparagraph (A) of this paragraph so that the number of
9 tutor positions is equal to the school ADM divided by two
10 hundred eighty-eight (288);

11

12 (II) Middle and high schools. If the
13 amount calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph
14 is less than the school ADM divided by three hundred
15 fifteen (315), then increase the amount calculated under
16 subparagraph (A) of this paragraph so that the number of
17 tutor positions is equal to the school ADM divided by three
18 hundred fifteen (315);

19

20 (III) For schools containing more than
21 one (1) grade band, the minimum number of tutors shall be
22 calculated as provided in subdivision (II) of this
23 subparagraph using the total school ADM.

1

2 (x) Extended day and summer school teachers:

3

4 (A) Calculated as the school's at-risk
5 students computed under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(A) divided by
6 one hundred twenty (120) then multiplied by six-tenths
7 (0.6) for schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and
8 schools not designated as alternative schools;

9

10 (B) Each school district shall receive a
11 minimum of one-half (0.5) position if the total FTE
12 calculated in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph is less
13 than one-half (0.5).

14

15 (xi) Substitute teachers:

16

17 (A) Calculated as the product of five
18 percent (5%) multiplied by the sum of FTE positions
19 calculated in paragraphs (ii) through (x) of this
20 subsection;

21

22 (B) The daily substitute rate shall be
23 equal to the product of one hundred two dollars and fifteen

1 cents (\$102.15) multiplied by seven and sixty-five
2 hundredths percent (7.65%) for social security and Medicaid
3 benefits;

4

5 (C) Total substitute teacher resources
6 under this paragraph shall be equal to the product of one
7 hundred seventy-five (175) multiplied by the product
8 calculated in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph multiplied
9 by the product calculated in subparagraph (B) of this
10 paragraph.

11

12 (xii) Supervisory aides:

13

14 (A) Elementary school supervisory aides
15 shall be calculated as the product of the school's ADM
16 multiplied by two (2) then divided by two hundred
17 eighty-eight (288) for schools with more than forty-nine
18 (49) ADM and schools not designated as an alternative
19 school;

20

21 (B) Middle school supervisory aides shall
22 be calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied
23 by two (2) then divided by three hundred fifteen (315) for

1 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
2 designated as an alternative school;

3

4 (C) High school supervisory aides shall be
5 calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied by
6 five (5) then divided by three hundred fifteen (315) for
7 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
8 designated as an alternative school;

9

10 (D) For schools with more than forty-nine
11 (49) ADM and containing an elementary school grade band and
12 a middle school grade band but not a high school grade
13 band, supervisory aide positions shall be calculated based
14 upon the formula in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph
15 using the total school ADM. For schools with more than
16 forty-nine (49) ADM and containing a high school grade band
17 and either an elementary school grade band or a middle
18 school grade band or both, supervisory aide positions shall
19 be calculated based upon the formula in subparagraph (C) of
20 this paragraph using the total school ADM. This
21 subparagraph shall not apply to schools designated as an
22 alternative school.

23

1 (xiii) Pupil support positions:

2

3 (A) Calculated as the school's at-risk
4 students computed under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(A) divided by
5 one hundred (100) for schools with more than forty-nine
6 (49) ADM and schools not designated as an alternative
7 school;

8

9 (B) Minimum pupil support positions.
10 Minimum pupil support positions shall be provided for
11 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
12 designated as an alternative school based upon the
13 following:

14

15 (I) Elementary schools. If the amount
16 calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph is less
17 than the school ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight
18 (288), then increase the amount of positions calculated
19 under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph to equal the
20 school ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight (288);

21

22 (II) Middle and high schools. If the
23 amount calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph

1 is less than the school ADM divided by three hundred
2 fifteen (315), then increase the amount of positions
3 calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph to
4 equal the school ADM divided by three hundred fifteen
5 (315);

6

7 (III) For schools containing more than
8 one (1) grade band, the minimum number of tutors shall be
9 calculated as provided in subdivision (II) of this
10 paragraph using the total school ADM.

11

12 (xiv) Counselors. Calculated as total middle and
13 high school ADM divided by two hundred fifty (250) for
14 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
15 designated as alternative schools;

16

17 (xv) Librarians. Shall be calculated for schools
18 with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
19 designated as alternative schools based upon the following:

20

21 (A) Elementary schools. Calculated as the
22 school's ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight (288);

23

1 (B) Middle schools and high schools with
2 more than forty-nine (49) ADM and less than one hundred
3 five (105) ADM, provide librarian positions by prorating
4 one (1) librarian position for one hundred five (105) ADM
5 down to no librarian positions for forty-nine (49) ADM. For
6 middle schools and high schools with ADM of one hundred
7 five (105) or more up to six hundred thirty (630), provide
8 one (1) librarian position. For middle schools and high
9 schools with more than six hundred thirty (630) ADM,
10 calculate librarian positions by dividing the school's ADM
11 by six hundred thirty (630);

12

13 (C) For schools containing more than one
14 (1) grade band and more than forty-nine (49) ADM,
15 librarians shall be calculated using the formula in
16 subparagraph (B) of this paragraph using the total school
17 ADM.

18

19 (xvi) School computer technicians. For middle
20 and high schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and
21 schools not designated as alternative schools, calculated
22 as each school's ADM divided by three hundred fifteen
23 (315). For schools containing more than one (1) grade band,

1 calculated using the total school ADM divided by three
2 hundred fifteen (315);

3

4 (xvii) Principals. Shall be calculated for
5 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
6 designated as alternative schools based upon the following:

7

8 (A) Elementary schools with more than
9 forty-nine (49) ADM and less than ninety-six (96) ADM,
10 provide principal positions by prorating one (1) principal
11 position for ninety-six (96) ADM down to no position at
12 forty-nine (49) ADM. Provide one (1) principal position for
13 elementary schools with ninety-six (96) or more ADM;

14

15 (B) Middle and high schools with more than
16 forty-nine (49) ADM and less than one hundred five (105)
17 ADM, provide principal positions by prorating one (1)
18 principal position for one hundred five (105) ADM down to
19 no position for forty-nine (49) ADM. Provide one (1)
20 principal position for middle schools and high schools with
21 one hundred five (105) or more ADM;

22

1 (C) For schools containing more than one
2 (1) grade band and more than forty-nine (49) ADM, provide
3 principal positions based upon the formula in subparagraph
4 (B) of this paragraph.

5

6 (xviii) Assistant principals:

7

8 (A) Prorate one (1) assistant principal
9 position for every two hundred eighty-eight (288)
10 elementary school ADM over two hundred eighty-eight (288)
11 ADM;

12

13 (B) Prorate one (1) assistant principal
14 position for every three hundred fifteen (315) middle
15 school and high school ADM over three hundred fifteen (315)
16 ADM;

17

18 (C) For schools containing more than one
19 (1) grade band, prorate one (1) assistant principal
20 position for every three hundred fifteen (315) ADM over
21 three hundred fifteen (315) ADM using the total school ADM;

22

1 (D) Provide one (1) assistant principal
2 position for a school with a total ADM of forty-nine (49)
3 or less or for a school designated as an alternative
4 school.

5

6 (xix) Secretaries. Calculated for schools with
7 more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as
8 alternative schools based upon the following:

9

10 (A) Elementary schools with more than
11 forty-nine (49) ADM and less than ninety-six (96) ADM,
12 provide secretary positions by prorating one (1) secretary
13 position for ninety-six (96) ADM down to no position at
14 forty-nine (49) ADM. Elementary schools with more than
15 ninety-six (96) ADM and up to two hundred eighty-eight
16 (288) ADM, provide one (1) secretary position. Prorate one
17 (1) additional secretary position for every two hundred
18 eighty-eight (288) elementary ADM over two hundred
19 eighty-eight (288) ADM;

20

21 (B) Middle schools and high schools with
22 more than forty-nine (49) ADM and less than one hundred
23 five (105) ADM, provide secretary positions by prorating

1 one (1) secretary position for one hundred five (105) ADM
2 down to no position at forty-nine (49) ADM. Middle schools
3 and high schools with more than one hundred five (105) ADM
4 and up to three hundred fifteen (315) ADM, provide one (1)
5 secretary position. Prorate one (1) additional secretary
6 position for every three hundred fifteen (315) middle
7 school and high school ADM over three hundred fifteen (315)
8 ADM;

9

10 (C) For schools containing more than one
11 (1) grade band and more than forty-nine (49) ADM, secretary
12 positions shall be calculated using the formula in
13 subparagraph (B) of this paragraph using the total school
14 ADM.

15

16 (xx) Clerical positions. Calculated for schools
17 with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
18 designated as alternative schools based upon the following:

19

20 (A) Elementary schools with more than
21 forty-nine (49) ADM, provide clerical positions by
22 prorating one (1) clerical position for every two hundred

1 eighty-eight (288) ADM down to no clerical positions for
2 forty-nine (49) ADM;

3

4 (B) Middle schools with more than
5 forty-nine (49) ADM, provide clerical positions by
6 prorating one (1) clerical position for every three hundred
7 fifteen (315) ADM down to no clerical positions for
8 forty-nine (49) ADM;

9

10 (C) High schools with more than forty-nine
11 (49) ADM, provide clerical positions by prorating four (4)
12 clerical positions for every six hundred thirty (630) ADM
13 down to no clerical positions for forty-nine (49) ADM;

14

15 (D) For schools with more than forty-nine
16 (49) ADM and containing an elementary school grade band and
17 middle school grade band but not a high school grade band,
18 clerical positions shall be calculated based upon the
19 formula in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph using the
20 total school ADM. For schools with more than forty-nine
21 (49) ADM and containing a high school grade band and either
22 an elementary school grade band or a middle school grade
23 band or both, clerical positions shall be calculated based

1 upon the formula in subparagraph (C) of this paragraph
2 using the total school ADM.

3

4 (xxi) Books and instructional materials.
5 Resources shall be calculated as the product of the
6 school's ADM multiplied by two hundred nine dollars and
7 thirty-three cents (\$209.33);

8

9 (xxii) Technology and equipment. Resources shall
10 be calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied
11 by two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00). This amount shall
12 not be subject to any external cost adjustment applicable
13 under W.S. 21-13-309(o);

14

15 (xxiii) Gifted and talented students. Resources
16 shall be calculated as the product of the school's ADM
17 multiplied by forty-four dollars and seven cents (\$44.07);

18

19 (xxiv) Career and technical education equipment
20 and materials. Resources shall be calculated as the product
21 of each high school's FTE vocational education teachers
22 reported under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(D)(III) multiplied by

1 ten thousand three hundred thirteen dollars and
2 eighty-eight cents (\$10,313.88);

3

4 (xxv) Student activities shall be based upon
5 each school's ADM. A middle school with ADM in grade nine
6 (9) shall have that ADM included in the high school ADM for
7 the high school the students would normally attend. Student
8 activity funding shall be calculated in the following
9 manner:

10

11 (A) Elementary school student activity
12 resources shall be calculated as the product of the total
13 elementary school ADM multiplied by twenty-six dollars and
14 two cents (\$26.02);

15

16 (B) Middle school student activity
17 resources shall be calculated as the product of the total
18 middle school ADM multiplied by:

19

20 (I) Eight hundred fifty-six dollars
21 (\$856.00) for a school with one (1) ADM, prorated down to
22 five hundred eighty-five dollars and forty-one cents
23 (\$585.41) for a school with one hundred five (105) ADM;

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(II) Five hundred eighty-five dollars and forty-one cents (\$585.41) for a school with one hundred five (105) ADM, prorated down to four hundred three dollars and twenty-nine cents (\$403.29) for a school with two hundred ten (210) ADM;

(III) Four hundred three dollars and twenty-nine cents (\$403.29) for a school with two hundred ten (210) ADM, prorated down to three hundred twenty-five dollars and twenty-three cents (\$325.23) for a school with three hundred fifteen (315) ADM;

(IV) Three hundred twenty-five dollars and twenty-three cents (\$325.23) for a school with three hundred fifteen (315) ADM, prorated down to two hundred eighty-six dollars and twenty cents (\$286.20) for a school with six hundred thirty (630) ADM;

(V) Two hundred eighty-six dollars and twenty cents (\$286.20) for a school with six hundred thirty (630) ADM, prorated down to two hundred twenty-one dollars

1 and sixteen cents (\$221.16) for a school with one thousand
2 two hundred sixty (1,260) or more ADM.

3

4 (C) High school student activity resources
5 shall be calculated as the product of the total high school
6 ADM multiplied by:

7

8 (I) Two thousand two hundred six
9 dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$2,206.59) for a school with
10 one (1) ADM, prorated down to one thousand six hundred
11 ninety-one dollars and eighteen cents (\$1,691.18) for a
12 school with one hundred five (105) ADM;

13

14 (II) One thousand six hundred
15 ninety-one dollars and eighteen cents (\$1,691.18) for a
16 school with one hundred five (105) ADM, prorated down to
17 one thousand three hundred sixty-five dollars and
18 ninety-five cents (\$1,365.95) for a school with two hundred
19 ten (210) ADM;

20

21 (III) One thousand three hundred
22 sixty-five dollars and ninety-five cents (\$1,365.95) for a
23 school with two hundred ten (210) ADM, prorated down to one

1 thousand one hundred five dollars and seventy-seven cents
2 (\$1,105.77) for a school with three hundred fifteen (315)
3 ADM;

4

5 (IV) One thousand one hundred five
6 dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$1,105.77) for a school
7 with three hundred fifteen (315) ADM, prorated down to
8 seven hundred eighty dollars and fifty-four cents (\$780.54)
9 for a school with six hundred thirty (630) ADM;

10

11 (V) Seven hundred eighty dollars and
12 fifty-four cents (\$780.54) for a school with six hundred
13 thirty (630) ADM, prorated down to six hundred fifty
14 dollars and forty-five cents (\$650.45) for a school with
15 one thousand two hundred sixty (1,260) or more ADM.

16

17 (xxvi) Professional development. Resources shall
18 be calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied
19 by one hundred thirty-seven dollars and seventy-two cents
20 (\$137.72);

21

22 (xxvii) Central office staff:

23

1 (A) For school district ADM of five hundred
2 (500) or less, three (3) administrative positions and three
3 (3) classified positions;

4

5 (B) For school district ADM from five
6 hundred (500) to one thousand (1,000), provide four (4)
7 administrative positions and four (4) classified positions
8 at one thousand (1,000) ADM, prorated down to three (3)
9 administrative positions and three (3) classified positions
10 at five hundred (500) ADM;

11

12 (C) For school district ADM from one
13 thousand (1,000) to three thousand five hundred (3,500),
14 provide eight (8) administrative positions and ten (10)
15 classified positions at three thousand five hundred (3,500)
16 ADM, prorated down to four (4) administrative positions and
17 four (4) classified positions at one thousand (1,000) ADM;

18

19 (D) For a school district with ADM greater
20 than three thousand five hundred (3,500), prorate eight (8)
21 administrative positions for every three thousand five
22 hundred (3,500) ADM and prorate ten (10) classified

1 positions for every three thousand five hundred (3,500)
2 ADM.

3

4 (xxviii) Central office nonpersonnel resources.

6 district ADM multiplied by four hundred dollars and twenty
7 cents (\$400.20);

8

9 (xxix) Maintenance and operations. Resourced as
10 follows:

11

12 (A) For school buildings containing more
13 than one (1) grade band or school, the resources shall be
14 generated at the highest grade band level using the total
15 ADM in the building;

16

17 (B) School custodians. For school buildings
18 with more than forty-nine (49) ADM, resources shall be
19 calculated using the average of the following four (4)
20 factors specified under subdivisions (I) through (IV) of
21 this subparagraph, plus an additional one-half (0.5) FTE
22 for middle or high schools:

1 (I) One (1) custodian multiplied by
2 the total of the number of teachers resourced under
3 paragraphs (i) through (v) of this subsection divided by

1 in accordance with W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(G)(II) then divided
2 by eighteen thousand (18,000);

3

4 (D) Maintenance workers. A base FTE
5 resourced using the average of the four (4) factors
6 specified under subdivisions (I), (II), (III) and (IV) of
7 this subparagraph plus the additional adjustments to the
8 base FTE amount as provided in subdivision (V) of this
9 subparagraph:

11 (I) One and one-tenth (1.1)
12 maintenance worker per school building;

14 (II) One (1) maintenance worker
15 multiplied by the total of the allowable gross square
16 footage of education space for the school building in

6 general fund operating expenditures divided by five million
7 dollars (\$5,000,000.00), then multiplied by a factor of one
8 and two-tenths (1.2);

10 (V) The base FTE calculated under this
11 subparagraph for each school building shall be adjusted as
12 follows:

14 (1) A school level adjustment for
15 elementary schools equal to the product of the base FTE
16 multiplied by a factor of eight-tenths (0.8), for middle
17 schools equal to the product of the base FTE multiplied by
18 a factor of one (1) and for high schools equal to the
19 product of the base FTE multiplied by a factor of two (2);

3 lesser of the actual site acreage on which the facility is
4 situated or the acreage specified in school facility

16 further adjusted by four and seventy-seven hundredths
17 percent (4.77%), further adjusted by ten and eight hundred

21 enacted by law. For additional school buildings added to

20 an elementary school grade band for teacher resources and
21 all remaining grades and as a middle school grade band for
22 teacher resources;

15 (D) Teacher salaries under this

20 and librarians. Teacher salaries shall be equal to
21 thirty-eight thousand ninety-eight dollars and ninety-one

1 multiplied by the average number of teacher positions that
2 have a master's degree, plus thirteen thousand eight

6 sixty-eight dollars and seventy cents (\$868.70) multiplied

13 shall be equal to thirty-nine thousand five hundred

17 computer technician positions that have a bachelor's
18 degree, plus six hundred fifty-nine dollars and eighty

22 (F) Supervisory aide salaries shall be
23 equal to seventeen thousand six hundred one dollars and

1 forty-five cents (\$17,601.45), plus two thousand forty-nine
2 dollars and forty cents (\$2,049.40) multiplied by the
3 average number of supervisory aide positions that have a
4 bachelor's degree, plus two hundred eighty-two dollars and
5 eighty cents (\$282.80) multiplied by the average years of
6 state experience;

8 (G) School secretary salaries shall be
9 equal to twenty-nine thousand eight hundred forty-six
10 dollars and eighty cents (\$29,846.80), plus four hundred

13 and clerical positions;

15 (H) School clerical salaries shall be equal
16 to twenty-two thousand nine hundred sixty-two dollars and

19 average years of state experience for all secretary and
20 clerical positions;
