Source of revenue increase:

Sales & use taxes and license fees on medical cannabis, effective May 31, 2023;

Assumptions:

The above estimate is provided by the Department of Revenue (Department), based on Colorado's medical marijuana program. The estimate utilizes figures from 2019 through 2021 and is adjusted for the difference in Wyoming's and Colorado's population (a factor of 10). The Department applied an application fee of \$3,000 for each license type. The Department estimates 200 medical marijuana dispensaries, 50 medical marijuana cultivation facilities, 50 medical marijuana manufacturing facilities and 5 medical marijuana testing facilities. Other revenue is indeterminable as other licensing will be required (caregivers and medical marijuana certification). The sales & use tax estimates in the above table are based on an average Wyoming sales & use tax rate of 5.35%. The effective date of the bill is May 31, 2023. Therefore, it is assumed that only one month of revenue would be received in FY 2023.

On its own, this bill will not result in a significant revenue increase from background check fees or require additional personnel and/or funding. However, passage of multiple bills of this type may result in a cumulative administrative impact to the Division of Criminal Investigation.

The fiscal impact to the judicial system is indeterminable due to an unknown number of cases.
