



2017 Donor Alliance Fact Sheet

Donor Alliance is a non-profit organization dedicated to saving lives through organ and tissue donation and transplantation. As the organ and tissue procurement agency for Colorado and most of Wyoming, Donor Alliance serves more than 5.8 million residents and more than 100 hospitals. Donor Alliance adheres to the highest medical, regulatory and ethical standards, and meets every performance standard. By respectfully working with the families of organ and tissue donors, maintaining partnerships with hospitals, educating residents on the life-saving benefits of donation and inspiring them to sign up on the state's donor registry, Donor Alliance is able to save lives through organ and tissue donation and transplantation. Colorado and Wyoming boast some of the highest rates of donor registration in the country, which directly translates to more lives saved and healed through organ and tissue transplantation. Donor Alliance is one of 58 federally designated organizations of its kind in the United States.

Vision Statement: Donor Alliance serves all who need transplantation by optimizing available organs and tissues with a commitment to education, collaboration, innovation, and influencing policy.

Fast Facts about Organ and Tissue Donation:

- **WHAT IT MEANS:** Registering as an organ, eye and tissue donor means you have made the decision to donate your organs, eyes and tissues at the time of your death. Your decision to be a donor takes priority over your family's preferences.
- **LIFESAVING IMPACT:** Just one donor can save up to eight lives through organ donation and save or heal more than 75 lives through eye and tissue donation.
- **ANYONE CAN REGISTER:** Anyone—regardless of age, lifestyle or medical condition—can register as a donor. Even those with chronic conditions, such as hepatitis and diabetes, can register to give the gift of life at any age.
- **WHAT CAN BE DONATED:** Organs that can be donated include the heart, liver, lungs, kidneys, pancreas and small intestine. Tissues that can be donated include bones, skin, tendons, heart valves, veins and corneas.
- **RELIGIOUS SUPPORT:** All major religions support organ, eye and tissue donation and view it as a final act of love and generosity.

Local stats:

- In Colorado and Wyoming, more than 2,500 people are currently waiting for a lifesaving organ transplant.
- 69% of Coloradans and 58% of Wyomingites are registered organ, eye and tissue donors.
- Of those waiting, more than 1,800 are waiting for a kidney—the organ most in need (74%)—and nearly 600 are waiting for a liver (23%).
- Colorado has one of the nation's highest-performing state donor registries with 69% of driver's license/ID card applicants registering as organ and tissue donors. Wyoming is also amongst the top 10 nationally at 59%.
- 424 people received lifesaving organ transplants in 2016 thanks to 139 selfless donors in Colorado and Wyoming.
- In 2016, Donor Alliance recovered organs for transplant from 139 donors; of those 67% were on either the Donate Life Colorado or Donate Life Wyoming Donor Registry.
- In 2016, Donor Alliance recovered tissue for transplant from 1,710 donors; of those 62% were on either the Donate Life Colorado or Wyoming Donor Registry.

National stats:

- Today, nearly 120,000 people are waiting for lifesaving organ transplants nationally; on average every ten minutes, someone is added to the national transplant waiting list.
- Of the patients waiting, more than 98 thousand (83%) are in need of a kidney and more than 14 thousand (12%) are in need of a liver transplant.
- Every day 22 people die while waiting for a lifesaving transplant.
- Every year, the lives of about 500,000 Americans are saved by organ and tissue donation.
- An average of 81 transplants take place every day in the United States.
- Every 10 minutes another name is added to the national transplant waiting list.
- Approximately 1,500,000 tissue transplants are performed annually.

Frequently Ask Questions About Organ and Tissue Donation:

What is organ and tissue donation?

Organ and tissue donation is the process of recovering organs and tissues from a deceased person, and transplanting them into others in order to save the lives of those in need. Up to eight lives can be saved per individual donor through organ donation and more than 75 lives can be saved and healed through eye and tissue donation.

What is the process for organ and tissue donation?

Organ, eye and tissue donation becomes an option only after all lifesaving efforts have been exhausted and death has been declared. If a patient meets clinical criteria, the hospital contacts Donor Alliance, the organ procurement organization serving Colorado and most of Wyoming. Donor Alliance determines medical suitability for donation and collaborates with the hospital to ensure the family is cared for and informed throughout the process. If a donor is determined to be a candidate for organ donation, medical matching information including size, blood and tissue type is entered into a database to determine the most suitable candidate in need of a lifesaving transplant. Donated eyes and tissues do not require preliminary matching. Organs and tissues are then recovered in a surgical environment by highly trained medical professionals. Organs must be transplanted into waiting patients in hospital transplant centers within hours of recovery. Tissue undergoes complex evaluation and processing into many therapeutic forms for future surgeries, and can be transplanted even after lengthy preservation periods.

What are the benefits of organ and tissue donation?

At the time of their death, just one donor can save up to eight lives through organ donation and save or heal more than 75 lives through eye and tissue donation. Saying yes to organ, eye and tissue donation saves lives. Every year, organ, eye and tissue transplants provide hope to tens of thousands of people suffering from disease, injury, trauma or blindness. Transplants offer patients a new chance at healthy and productive lives, returning them to their families, friends and communities. Transplantation requires the commitment of organ, eye and tissue donors to save and heal lives. There continues to be a great need for more people to register to give the gift of life.

How do Colorado and Wyoming residents become organ and tissue donors?

Residents can register their decision to be organ, eye and tissue donors at the time of death by saying 'yes' each time they obtain or renew a driver license or state ID, or at www.DonateLifeColorado.org or www.DonateLifeWyoming.com anytime. Anyone can register to be an organ, eye and tissue donor, regardless of age, race, medical history, religion or income. Even those with chronic conditions, such as hepatitis and diabetes, can register to give the gift of life at any age.

How are organs allocated to recipients?

When a deceased organ donor is identified, a transplant coordinator from an organ procurement organization, like Donor Alliance, accesses The United Network for Organ Sharing's (UNOS) secure, centralized computer network and enters necessary medical information about the donor. The system uses this information to match the medical characteristics of the candidates waiting against those of the donor. The system then generates a ranked list of patients who are suitable to receive each organ. Some of the key elements considered in matching organs from deceased donors to patients on the waiting list are: blood type, body size, severity of patient's medical condition, distance between the donor's hospital and the patient's hospital, the patient's waiting time, and the availability of the potential recipient (e.g., the patient can be contacted and has no current infection or other temporary reason that transplant cannot take place).

Does Donor Alliance facilitate living donation and deceased donation?

Donor Alliance only facilitates deceased donation. Donor Alliance supports the altruistic gift of living organ donation and sees it as a beneficial way to help close the gap in the waiting list and available organs. Donor Alliance is not responsible for facilitating or coordinating living donation; it is the responsibility of transplant centers.

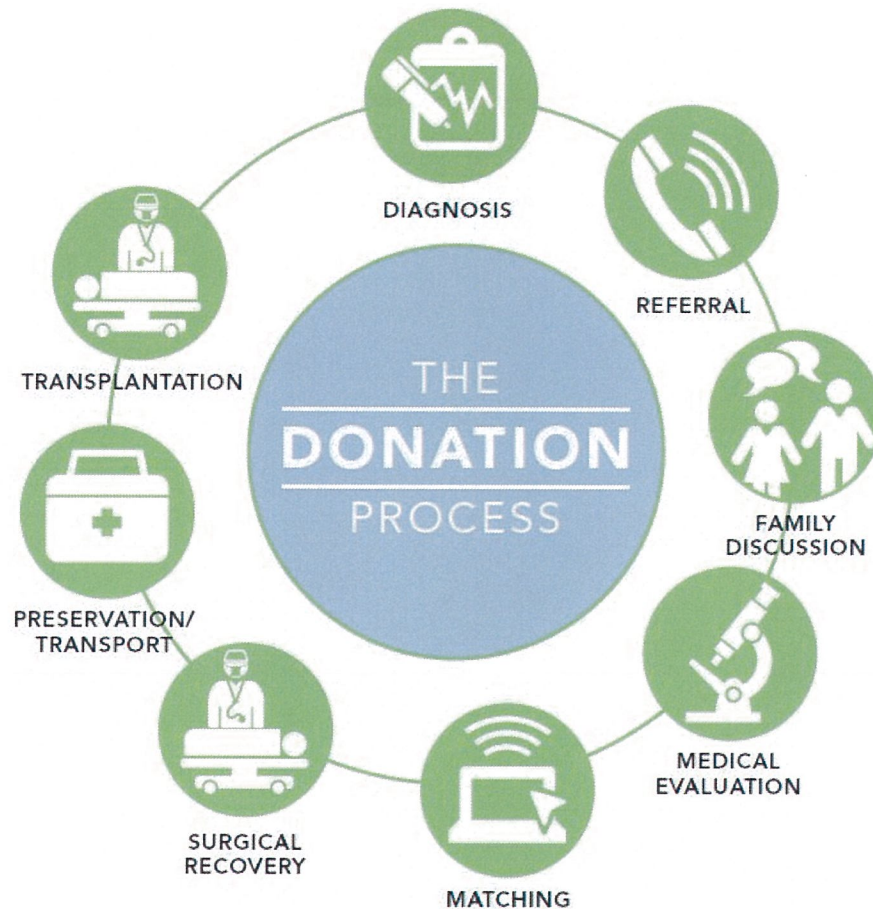

There are no costs associated with organ, eye and tissue donation. Your family will be responsible for the cost of your care prior to death and any funeral expenses.

FACT: DIGNITY AND RESPECT

Donors and their families are treated with the utmost respect and care. Donation will not delay or prevent funeral arrangements, including an open casket funeral.

FACT: FAIR AND EQUITABLE

Severity of illness, time spent waiting, blood/tissue type, size and distance are the factors that determine a person's place on the organ transplant waiting list.

FACT: MINORITY NEED

Transplant matches made within ethnic groups can be more compatible. That is why it is important for people in minority communities to register their decision to be donors.

FACT: RELIGIOUS SUPPORT

All major religions support organ, eye and tissue donation and view it as a final act of love and generosity.

Transplantation requires the commitment of organ, eye and tissue donors to save and heal lives. Even hometown heroes can be saved by the gift of life.
