A BILL

for

AN ACT relating to elections; requiring a qualified elector to be a bona fide resident of the state of Wyoming for not less than thirty (30) days before the date of the election in which they offer to vote; and providing for an effective date.
Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

Furnishing of oath forms; contents thereof. б (b) Following the provision of the information 7 required in subsection (a) of this section, the form shall 8 9 require the applicant's signature in full below the 10 following oath: 11 12 I, ..., do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I am a citizen of the United States; that I am a bona fide resident of the 13 state of Wyoming and this county; I have resided in the 14 15 state for not less than thirty (30) days before the date of 16 the election; that if registered in another county or state, I hereby request that my registration be withdrawn; 17 that I will be at least eighteen (18) years of age on or 18 before the next 19 election; that Ι am not currently 20 adjudicated a mentally incompetent person, that I have not 21 been convicted of a felony, or if I have been convicted of a felony, I have had my civil or voting rights restored by 22 23 a competent authority; and that the voter registration

10 11 12 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25	 For reference, five of the six neighboring states to Wyoming do maintain durational residency requirements for voters, with Nebraska being the only state that does not require residency for any fixed period of time before a person may vote in an election. A short excerpt of each state's requirements are as follows: Colorado: must be a resident in the state for twenty-two days immediately prior to the election in which the person intends to vote. C.R.S. 1-2-101(1)(b). Idaho: must be a resident of the state and the county in which the person offers to vote thirty days prior to the day of the election. Idaho Code § 34-402. Montana: must be a resident of the state and the county in which the person offers to vote for at least thirty days. M.C.A 13-1-111(1)(c).
26 27 28	• Nebraska: must be a resident of the state but there is no additional durational residency requirement. R.R.S. Neb. § 32-110.
29 30 31 32 33	• South Dakota: must maintain residence in the state for at least thirty days prior to submitting a voter registration form. S.D.C.L. § 12-4-1 (note: this requirement was passed this year pursuant to South Dakota Senate Bill 139).
34 35 36 37 38	• <u>Utah</u> : must be a resident of the state in which the person offers to vote for at least thirty days immediately before the election. Utah Code Ann. § 20A-2-101.

Under the federal Voting Rights Act, specifically 52 U.S.C. 1 § 10502(c), any citizen who is otherwise qualified to vote 2 in an election for the president and vice president of the 3 United States cannot be denied the right to vote in that 4 5 election based on a durational residency requirement of the state or political subdivision in which they reside. 6 7 8 While do have durational residency many states requirements, there is not a uniform way in which the 9 federal provision has been implemented. Many states do not 10 address the federal requirement in statute but would be 11 12 otherwise required to allow voters who would not meet the state's residency requirements to vote for the president 13 14 and vice president of the United States. 15 16 However, Wisconsin is an example of a state that does include a provision to allow for presidential voting 17 18 despite a durational residency requirement in the state's 19 election code: 20 21 "Any person who was or who is an eligible elector under ss. 22 6.02 and 6.03, except that he or she has been a resident of 23 this state for less than 28 consecutive days prior to the 24 date of the presidential election, is entitled to vote for 25 the president and vice president but for no other offices. 26 The fact that the person was not registered to vote in the 27 state from which he or she moved does not prevent voting in this state if the elector is otherwise qualified." Wis. 28 29 Stat. § 6.15. 30 The Committee may wish to consider whether or not 31 to 32 include similar language into this bill draft regarding 33 durational residency requirements. 34 35 36 ****** 37 38 (END)

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
