for

- AN ACT relating to emergency medical services; providing legislative findings; declaring emergency medical services an essential service; creating the emergency medical services account; authorizing the department of health to administer the account as specified; requiring rulemaking; providing an appropriation; and providing for effective dates.
- 9 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:
- 11 **Section 1**. W.S. 33-36-116 is created to read:

33-36-116. Legislative findings; declaring emergency
medical services an essential service; emergency medical
services account created; department of health to oversee
emergency medical services grants.

The legislature finds and declares that emergency 6 medical services are an essential service. The legislature 7 8 finds that the provision of emergency medical services is a 9 matter of vital concern affecting the public health, safety 10 and welfare of the citizens of Wyoming. It is the purpose of this section to promote the maintenance of an effective 11 12 system of emergency medical services, including the 13 necessary equipment, personnel and facilities to ensure that all emergency patients receive prompt and adequate 14 15 medical care throughout the range of emergency conditions 16 encountered.

18 (b) There is established an account to be known as
19 the emergency medical services account. Funds in the
20 account are appropriated to the department of health for
21 purposes of providing grants to political subdivisions
22 within the state that are in need of emergency medical
23 service funding. The account shall consist of those funds

1 appropriated to the account by the legislature and all

2 monies received from federal grants and other

3 contributions, grants, gifts, transfers, bequests and

4 donations to the account. Earnings accruing to the account

5 shall be retained in the account and shall be expended for

6 the purposes provided in this section. Unless otherwise

7 provided in the appropriation, appropriations to the

8 account shall not lapse or revert at the end of any fiscal

9 period.

11 (c) Beginning November 1, 2024 and every fiscal year

12 thereafter, the department of health shall request an

13 appropriation to fund the emergency medical services

14 account from the joint appropriations committee.

16 (d) The department of health is authorized to expend

17 monies in the emergency medical services account for

18 purposes of providing grants to political subdivisions

19 within the state for the continued beneficial operation of

20 emergency medical service providers in the state.
