SUBCOMMITTEE ON WESTON COUNTY CLERK 2024 POST-ELECTION AUDIT – REPORT

October 2025

INTRODUCTION:

The Subcommittee of the Management Audit Committee on the Weston County Clerk 2024 General Election (Subcommittee) was created to receive testimony regarding the post-election audit results submitted by the Weston County Clerk following the 2024 General Election and to recommend any potential statutory changes appropriate to address similar circumstances in the future. At the conclusion of the Subcommittee's September 29, 2025, meeting in Casper, LSO staff were asked to produce a comprehensive draft report that includes a summary of the meeting testimony, information on the administrative process used to investigate election complaints, and a statement of substantive findings.

BACKGROUND:

On December 23, 2024, Governor Gordon's Office received a verified complaint from nine qualified electors of Weston County seeking the removal of Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock for misconduct and/or malfeasance in office. A second verified complaint from a single qualified elector was received by the Governor's Office on January 10, 2025; the allegations in this complaint were the same as in the first complaint received. In summary, these allegations include the following:

- mishandling election ballots by ordering and using multiple ballot versions in the general election:
- improperly testing voting machines during the primary and general elections;
- using incorrect ballots in the general election, which necessitated hand recounts; and
- causing an undercount of 1289 votes.

In its investigation of these allegations, the Governor's Office indicated Clerk Hadlock did not deny any of these four alleged acts. Governor Gordon ultimately decided that Clerk Hadlock's actions did not rise to the level of misconduct or malfeasance in office.

On March 10, 2025, Secretary of State Gray sent a letter to Governor Gordon, Attorney General Hill and Weston County Attorney Stulken formally requesting Clerk Hadlock's removal from office. The basis for Secretary of State Gray's request included the same allegations as those

contained in the verified complaints made previously by qualified electors, but also included an additional allegation that Clerk Hadlock filed a false post-election audit with the Secretary of State's Office. Post-election audits are required of all county clerks, and a minimum of 75 ballots are randomly selected for review. This additional allegation by Secretary of State Gray further indicated that after a hand-count by the Weston County Canvassing Board confirming significant vote-counting errors in two races, the incorrect post-election audit remained unchanged. At Secretary of State Gray's insistence, Clerk Hadlock filed a second post-election audit six days after her initial filing. This second filing identified 21 ballots – out of a random sample of 75 ballots – with a discrepancy. In his request for the removal of Clerk Hadlock, Secretary of State Gray highlighted this additional allegation as an indication of "a repeated and heightened level of misconduct."

At the request of the Chairman, the Management Audit Committee added this topic to the agenda for its July 9, 2025 meeting. The issue of the false post-election audit was presented by Secretary of State Gray. This additional allegation by the Secretary of State's Office, though not a verified complaint by either a qualified elector of Weston County or the Weston County Board of Commissioners, served as one of two principal factors underlying the creation of this subcommittee. The other principal factor was the number of concerns raised by Weston County voters, as evidenced by the two verified complaints made to the Governor's Office by Weston County qualified electors. The Subcommittee was tasked with determining whether there are any legislative solutions to address the Weston County 2024 election issue and better respond to comparable circumstances in the future.

DISCUSSION:

The Subcommittee met on September 29, 2025, to receive testimony on issues surrounding the 2024 general election ballot count in Weston County. The meeting can be viewed on YouTube – Weston County Clerk 2024 General Election Subcommittee Meeting **September 29, 2025**.

Chairwoman Rodriguez-Williams provided a summary of the issues that led to the creation of a subcommittee and explained the reasoning that supported issuing a subpoena to Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock. Chairwoman Rodriguez-Williams read the subpoena served to Clerk Hadlock on September 23, 2025 (**Appendix C**). Chairwoman Rodriguez-Williams also read a September 25, 2025, letter from Clerk Hadlock (**Appendix D**) addressed to Management Audit Committee Chairman Knapp, asserting her stated schedule conflict and her communication of such to Legislative Service Office staff. Clerk Hadlock's letter also referenced testimony that would be offered by two members of the Weston County Hand-Count Committee, Debra Piana and Ann Slagle.

WESTON COUNTY CLERK

Chairwoman Rodriguez-Williams requested Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock to come forward to provide testimony. Clerk Hadlock failed to appear at the meeting, and Chairwoman Rodriguez-Williams noted that the Clerk refused to honor the subpoena compelling her testimony in accordance with W.S. 28-1-109 through 28-1-112. Chairwoman Rodriguez-Williams recessed

the meeting for five minutes to contact Management Audit Committee Chairman Knapp regarding the enforcement of the subpoena and to confer with Legislative Service Office staff.

Following the brief recess, Chairwoman Rodriguez-Williams stated that authorities would be contacted regarding Clerk Hadlock's refusal to obey the subpoena and stated that enforcement of the subpoena violation was a priority for the Subcommittee. It was noted that with her refusal to adhere to a lawful subpoena, Clerk Hadlock could be charged with a misdemeanor, punishable by "a fine of not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and imprisonment in county jail for a period not to exceed six (6) months," per W.S. 28-1-110(c).

WESTON COUNTY ELECTION HAND-COUNT COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Debra Piana, a member of the Weston County Hand-Count Committee, stated that she had no prepared testimony, but would attempt to answer any of the Subcommittee's questions. Upon questioning, Ms. Piana indicated the hand-count process was completed with six individuals examining ballots. In acknowledgement of Secretary of State Gray's follow-up regarding the post-election audit process, the Hand-Count Committee recounted county commissioner votes due to alternating names on the ballot and also recounted votes cast in the House District 1 race, noting a significant difference from the number of votes cast in the primary election.

Ms. Piana stated she had not been involved in elections prior to the 2024 primary and general elections. When asked about numeric discrepancies between the machine count and the hand count, Ms. Piana acknowledged significant differences, around 1,000 to 2,000 votes that were undercounted, but she was not sure of the exact differences. She stated that the outcome of the elections remained unchanged. Ms. Piana also stated that Clerk Hadlock could answer questions regarding the post-election audit issues more thoroughly.

Ann Slagle, a longtime election judge and member of the Weston County Hand-Count Committee, described her perspective on the hand-count process. Ms. Slagle identified anomalies in Precinct 2-1 (Osage) reporting, where only two votes were recorded for Representative Neiman in the House District 1 race despite individuals confirming greater voter support. Ms. Slagle noted the absence of formal hand-count training. Ms. Slagle also reported that three different ballot versions had been printed, but machines could only recognize one, potentially obscuring discrepancies in races. Ms. Slagle indicated that the multiple ballots and associated machine-reading difficulties were not acknowledged by Clerk Hadlock.

Ms. Slagle emphasized that the election process is entirely controlled by the County Clerk, noting the risk of mistakes or the potential for fraud. Ms. Slagle suggested that political parties could appoint canvassing board members, thereby allowing review of ballots before recording, and random audits could be done by the Secretary of State's Office. Ms. Slagle stated the Hand-Count Committee recounted approximately 4,800 County Commissioner and House District 1 votes. Ms. Slagle shared her concern that trust in the election system had been negatively impacted.

SECRETARY OF STATE

Chuck Gray, Secretary of State, highlighted concerns his office had regarding the 2024 postelection audit submission from Weston County, referring to materials he provided in **Appendix** **E**. Secretary of State Gray's report stated he referred the issues to the Weston County Attorney and the Attorney General's Office and also noted that Governor Gordon did not pursue removal of Clerk Hadlock, as requested in his report.

Secretary of State Gray detailed discrepancies in the post-election audit, explaining that 21 of 75 randomly-selected ballots failed a comparison test, raising questions about whether the audit was conducted properly or misreported. Secretary of State Gray indicated that Clerk Hadlock was initially reluctant to conduct a hand-count and attributed the instances of undervoting to voter opinions on the House District 1 candidate's role in legislative redistricting. Secretary of State Gray emphasized the seriousness of these discrepancies, particularly if races had been contested. Had either of the two races in question been contested, reported undervoting might not have been as significant, and further scrutiny of votes cast in the races might not have occurred. Secretary of State Gray criticized the lack of follow-up from the Weston County Attorney and the Attorney General's Office, and stressed that counties could have additional time after 5:00 p.m. the day after the election to finish the 75-ballot comparison needed to complete post-election audits. Secretary of State Gray also noted that counties could choose not to use machines and that the efficacy of the system relied on trust, which was undermined by these errors. Secretary of State Gray also emphasized the importance of including party representatives in audits and hand-counts for transparency.

GOVERNOR'S OFFICE

Betsy Anderson, General Counsel and Deputy Chief of Staff for Governor Gordon, testified regarding Governor Gordon's response to verified complaints against Clerk Hadlock (Appendix F). Ms. Anderson explained that Governor Gordon determined there was no misconduct, malfeasance, gross negligence, or willful negligence by Clerk Hadlock. Ms. Anderson stated that the verified complaints considered by the Governor's Office did not include any reference to the post-election audit results submitted by Clerk Hadlock.

Ms. Anderson addressed whether qualified electors or county commissioners would have been aware of issues with the post-election audit prior to filing complaints, and indicated they probably were not aware of those issues. Ms. Anderson confirmed that a complaint could now be made, but only by a qualified elector of Weston County or the Weston County Board of Commissioners, and she reiterated adherence of the Governor's Office to the statutory requirements of W.S. 18-3-902(a). Ms. Anderson also responded to questions about Governor Gordon's decision not to act on prior requests for removal of the Weston County Clerk. Ms. Anderson acknowledged the importance of the Secretary of State's oversight in the election process.

WYOMING COUNTY CLERKS ASSOCIATION

Malcolm Ervin, Platte County Clerk and President of the Wyoming County Clerks Association, testified regarding statewide election procedures and shared insights as President of the Clerks Association. He emphasized best practices for hand counts, ballot auditing, and training. Clerk Ervin highlighted the need for clear statutory guidance, improved communication between counties and the Secretary of State's Office, and support for clerks to conduct accurate audits and reconcile discrepancies efficiently.

FREMONT COUNTY CLERK

Julie Freese, Fremont County Clerk, testified about ballot proofing and approval processes. Clerk Freese noted that the three versions of ballots circulated in Weston County's 2024 General Election caused misalignment issues, further noting that machines only operate correctly with properly printed ballots. Clerk Freese confirmed that post-election audits serve to reveal misaligned ballots. Clerk Freese then recommended reforms, including forming audit working groups, improving training, refining testing standards, better ballot custody procedures, and potential legislative collaboration regarding earlier primary election dates.

SUBCOMMITTEE CONCLUSIONS

- 1. In addition to the valid version of Weston County's 2024 General Election ballot, two invalid versions of the same ballot were distributed for use, causing machine-reading errors that resulted in 1,279 votes cast that were incorrectly identified by the Weston County Clerk as undervotes. This concern was cited in both of the verified complaints made by Weston County qualified electors, as well as in the unverified complaint made by Secretary of State Gray.
- 2. Election processes, including post-election audit processes required of all counties, are almost exclusively overseen by county clerks.
- 3. The Weston County Clerk's submission of the County's post-election audit results to the Secretary of State's Office failed to identify 21 instances of machine-reading errors in a random sample size of 75. These errors led to a complete hand-count for two races, exposing valid candidate votes that were not counted in the original vote count, rather than confirming widespread under-voting.
- 4. Pursuant to W.S. 18-3-902(a), only qualified electors and county boards of commissioners can make verified complaints against a county officer for misconduct or malfeasance in office for the Governor's consideration. This requirement could limit the ability of persons with awareness of errors and omissions in largely internal processes from being able to file a verified complaint. As stated during testimony, a verified complaint regarding the false post-election audit could still be made by either a qualified elector of Weston County or the Weston County Board of Commissioners.

SUBCOMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION FOR POTENTIAL LEGISLATIVE ACTION

In addition to finalization of this report for consideration by the Management Audit Committee during its October 21, 2025 meeting, the Subcommittee asked LSO staff for the four following bill drafts that will be recommended for consideration by the Management Audit Committee:

- 26LSO-0248 Legislative subpoena-penalties This bill would increase the current monetary penalty for refusing to obey a subcommittee subpoena from \$100 to \$750, consistent with other Wyoming statutes for failure to obey a lawful subpoena.
- 26LSO-0249 Falsifying election documents This bill would establish penalties for submitting false post-election audit results to the Secretary of State's Office.
- 26LSO-0250 Post-election audit procedures This bill would require major political party representation in post-election audit processes, including review of ballots and reporting to the Secretary of State's Office.
- 26LSO-0251 Removal of county officers-election issues This bill would grant the Secretary of State the same authority as the Governor currently has in recommending removal of a county clerk for misconduct and/or malfeasance in office.

Any of these bill drafts could be sponsored by the Management Audit Committee, another interim committee, or an individual legislator.

The Subcommittee also requested additional information from the Secretary of State's Office, and indicated answers to these additional questions could be presented to the Management Audit Committee during its October 21, 2025 meeting.

And finally, the Subcommittee asked LSO staff to be prepared to speak to Management Audit Committee options should prosecution not move forward pursuant to W.S. 28-109 through 28-1-112.

Re: Election Code Violation Referral and Request for Removal, Weston County Clerk

Dear Governor Mark Gordon, Attorney General Hill, and County Attorney Stulken:

This letter pertains to the conduct of Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock. First, it refers several Election Code Violation Complaints received by the Wyoming Secretary of State's Office following the 2024 Election Cycle, and independent concerns raised regarding the conduct of Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock. After careful review and consideration of the information contained in these complaints, as well as our office's independent review of Clerk Hadlock's conduct and the representations she made to our office and the public, I have determined that these complaints should be forwarded to the office of the Weston County Attorney and the Attorney General for further investigation and prosecution in accordance with W.S. 22-26-121.

Currently, the Governor is considering whether to remove Clerk Hadlock due to misconduct or malfeasance. Because I have also determined that Clerk Hadlock's conduct rises to the level of misconduct and malfeasance in her office, I am recommending that the Weston County clerk be removed in accordance with W.S. 18-3-902.

I. FACTUAL BACKGROUND

Becky Hadlock is the county clerk of Weston County, Wyoming. Clerk Hadlock's conduct has been the subject of complaints and problems for some time, but most prominently

during the 2024 General Election. The analysis will begin with Clerk Hadlock's conduct in the 2024 Primary Election and will then proceed to discuss the 2024 General Election, culminating in the false submission of Clerk Hadlock's election audit for the General Election. It is important to discuss the history of Clerk Hadlock's actions to lay out the cumulative effect of her misconduct.

A. 2024 Primary Election

Weston County Public Testing of Voting Equipment for 2024 Primary Election

Weston County was one of numerous counties whose public testing of voting machines failed to comport with W.S. 22-11-104. By way of background, before each election in which an electronic voting system is used, county clerks are required to conduct a public logic and accuracy test of the equipment that is to be used in the election. *See* W.S. 22-11-104(b)(iii). This test must be conducted at least two weeks before the election. *Id.* W.S. 22-11-104(b)(iii) sets various requirements for the use of test ballots in logic and accuracy tests:

The test shall be conducted by processing a preaudited group of paper ballots or ballot cards on which are recorded a predetermined number of valid votes for each candidate and on each measure and shall include for each office one (1) or more ballots which have votes in excess of the number allowed by law in order to test the ability of the automatic tabulating equipment to reject such votes. During the test a different number of valid votes shall be assigned to each candidate for an office, and for and against each measure.

The Weston County Clerk was one of several county clerks whose logic and accuracy test did not assign a different number of votes to each candidate, necessitating a retest of their voting machines prior to the 2024 Primary Election, which also failed to comport with Wyoming law. *See* Exhibit 1, Email from Becky Hadlock to Paul Raines, August 13, 2024. It is unclear whether Clerk Hadlock retested for a third time to remedy the errors in the first two tests.

Weston County's Failure to Properly Seal and Custody Voting Equipment and Ballots

As reported by a complaint received by the Secretary of State's office, multiple election judges in Weston County contacted the Weston County Clerk, noting multiple failures in the 2024 Primary Election, including inadequate training of election judges prior to the day of the election, practices and procedures which did not ensure proper chain of custody of voting machines and ballots, and improper use of seals on voting equipment. *See* Exhibit 2, Election Code Complaint 2024-31, Email and Attachments, "Formal Complaint to Office of the Wyoming Secretary of State" and "Important issues that contribute to the lack of integrity of our Weston County Elections, submitted by Susan Love, September 11, 2024. These included the failure to of the Weston County Clerk to deliver partisan and non-partisan ballots to be properly sealed and delivered as required by W.S. 22-12-107 and W.S. 22-12-108, the failure to deliver sample ballots to polling locations as required by W.S. 22-6-104, and the failure of the Weston County Clerk to follow appropriate safeguards and chain of custody for voting machine seals and keys to voting machines, as required by W.S. 22-10-109.

In a response to many of these allegations, Clerk Hadlock sent an email to the individuals, in which Clerk Hadlock admitted to many of these failures, stating in pertinent part:

Things that we already are aware of and are already working on for the General are ballots being sealed for pickup (this was an oversight on our part), the Democratic and Non-Partisan ballots being left out of the bags (again an oversight on our part).

Id. As outlined in the email communication from Clerk Hadlock admitting some of these failures, Clerk Hadlock suggested that these be corrected in the 2024 General Election. However, Clerk Hadlock's conduct during the 2024 General Election showed continued problems, culminating in her actions on the day of the election and afterwards.

B. 2024 General Election

Weston County Public Testing of Voting Equipment for 2024 General Election

In the weeks leading up to the 2024 General Election, there were a number of acts or omissions which were directly observed by the Wyoming Secretary of State's Office which demonstrated a high degree of both incompetence as well as potential violations of the Wyoming Election Code. This began with the Weston County logic and accuracy test. As elaborated on above, before each election in which an electronic voting system is used, county clerks are required to conduct a public logic and accuracy test of the equipment that is to be used in the election. See W.S. 22-11-104(b)(iii). This test must be conducted at least two weeks before the election. Id. As noted above, W.S. 22-11-104(b)(iii) sets various requirements for the use of test ballots in logic and accuracy tests.

Chapter 29, Section 6(e) of the Secretary of State's Election Procedures Rules requires notice of the public testing of voting equipment, as well as allow members of the public to be present, stating in part:

The County Clerk shall hold a public L&A test of the voting equipment before any ballot tabulation device is used. The County Clerk shall notify in writing, as specified in W.S. 22-10-108, the chairman of each political party and all independent candidates informing them of the date, time, and place for testing the ballot marking and ballot tabulation devices. **Other witnesses may be present.**

(Emphasis Added).

October 22, 2024 marked the last day in which a logic and accuracy test could be performed under Wyoming law. On the evening of October 22, 2024, I sent an email explaining Weston County was the only county that had not certified the completion of their logic and accuracy test to the Wyoming Secretary of State's Office as required by Wyoming law. In response to this, Clerk Hadlock submitted the results of her test to the Secretary of State on the evening of October 22, 2024, which was the last day to conduct the test. See Exhibit 3, Email chain between Secretary of State Chuck Gray and Clerk Becky Hadlock, October 22, 2024. Despite multiple communications leading up to the 2024 Primary Election and 2024 General Election, including written guidance from the Wyoming Secretary of State's Office advising that

W.S. 22-11-104(b)(iii) requires that a "different number of valid votes shall be assigned to each candidate for an office, and for and against each measure," the Weston County Clerk again submitted a test in which a number of precincts in her test results contained the same number of votes assigned to each candidate, and a summary report demonstrating the same number of votes assigned to a candidate and a write-in candidate. *Id.* The Weston County Clerk sent a separate email certifying these results. *Id.*

On October 25, 2024, counsel for the Wyoming Republican Party contacted the Weston County Attorney regarding various alleged errors in Hadlock's logic and accuracy test and the test's violations of W.S. 22-11-104(b)(iii). *See* Exhibit 4, Forwarded email from Brian Shuck to Weston County Attorney Stulken, October 25, 2024.

In response to these allegations, Clerk Hadlock attempted to contact the Wyoming Secretary of State's Office, in which she was reminded of the requirements of W.S. 22-11-104(b)(iii). See Exhibit 5, Email from Secretary of State Chuck Gray to Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock, October 29, 2024. In agreeing to conduct a retest on October 30, 2024, Clerk Hadlock sent an email to the Wyoming Secretary of State's Office requesting permission to only have the chairmen of each of the major county parties present, as opposed to the public at large, as required by Chapter 29, Section 6(e) of the Secretary of State's Election Procedures. Exhibit 6, Email exchange between Secretary of State's Office counsel Joe Rubino to Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock, October 30, 2024. In response, the office reminded her that under the Secretary of State's Election Procedures rules, Chapter 29, Section 6(e), other witnesses were allowed to be present at this test. *Id.* Hadlock subsequently conducted a re-test and submitted the results to the Secretary of State on October 31, 2024. See Exhibit 7, Email from Hadlock, October 31, 2024.

2024 General Election Night

On November 5, 2024, Wyoming administered the 2024 General Election. Pursuant to Chapter 15, Section 4 of the Secretary of State's Election Procedures, all county clerks are required to submit their unofficial election night results to the Secretary of State by 10:30 on election night.

On the evening of November 5th, Clerk Hadlock submitted the unofficial election results for House District 1. According to the unofficial results for House District 1 as reported by the Weston County Clerk, Chip Neiman received 166 votes, and there were 1,289 undervotes for this office. See Exhibit 8, Unofficial Summary and Precinct Results. Although Clerk Hadlock did not submit county level results to the Wyoming Secretary of State's Office, the unofficial general election results for county commissioners stated that Ed Wagoner received 2,362 votes, and Marty Ertman received 2,225 votes. See, Supra, Exhibit 13.

Upon noticing the highly unusual discrepancy of undervotes for House District 1, I attempted to contact Clerk Hadlock via telephone shortly before midnight, and reached a highly unprofessional voicemail at the Weston County Clerk's office. After multiple unsuccessful attempts to contact Clerk Hadlock via telephone, I contacted the Weston County Sheriff, Bryan Colvard, directly, and requested Sheriff Colvard locate Clerk Hadlock. Following this request to the Weston County Sheriff, Clerk Hadlock eventually called our office back, and, when asked

about the discrepancies concerning the House District 1 race, denied that there were any irregularities in the vote totals.

In the days that followed the 2024 General Election, the Secretary of State's Office received multiple reports that Clerk Hadlock communicated to members of the public and media that the number of undervotes were not anomalous, and were the natural result of a "protest" against the policy positions of Representative Neiman. Exhibit 9, Clerk's Error Results in votes not Being Counted in Legislative Race, News Letter Journal, https://newslj.com/clerks-error-results-votes-not-being-counted-legislative-race. Our office also received reports that Clerk Hadlock made several representations to members of the public that an individual who was appointed by the Weston County Republican Party as a poll watcher, was an election judge, despite not receiving any training, and without being administered any oath as required by W.S. 22-8-115, raising questions about this representation from the clerk. See Exhibit 10, Election Complaint 2024-38, Karen Drost.

I indicated my concerns with the anomalies in calls on the evening of the election as well as the morning of November 6th before any post-election audit had been filed with our office.

Clerk Hadlock Filed a False Post-Election Audit with the Secretary of State's Office

As required by W.S. 22-6-130, which requires that county clerks conduct a post-election audit of a sample size of ballots cast in the prior election and provide the results to the Secretary of State before the canvassing board convenes, Clerk Hadlock filed her post-election audit with the Secretary of State's Office on November 6, 2024. Despite the anomalies communicated by the Secretary of State, the audit reported audit findings of "no issues" for each ballot audited. Clerk Hadlock affirmatively indicated that Hadlock had audited the requisite number of ballots, and that they matched the results that were recorded in the cast vote record. See Exhibit 11, Post Election Audit Results from 2024 General Election Reported by Weston County Clerk, Emailed November 6, 2024. Following my verbal concerns on both the night of November 5, as well as November 6, I also followed up my verbal communications expressing concern with a written email on November 6 requesting a hand examination of the ballots by the county canvassing board. See Exhibit 12, Email Exchange between Secretary Gray and Clerk Hadlock. This email requested clear communication with the public regarding the timing of the canvassing board, which is a public meeting. Id.

Weston County Ultimately Yields to Requests for a Hand Count, Cause of Result Uncovered as Error of Weston County Clerk

In the days following the 2024 General Election, Clerk Hadlock showed a resistance to hand counting the suspected races, reporting to individuals that no error had occurred. Responding to repeated requests by the Wyoming Secretary of State for a hand examination of the ballots, ultimately on November 7 the county clerk and the County Clerk's Association agreed to conduct a hand examination of the ballots. The Weston County Canvassing Board conducted a hand count during the County Canvassing Board meeting on November 8, 2024 to resolve the suspected discrepancies in the House District 1 and county commissioners races. The hand count for the House District 1 race found that Neiman received 1,268 votes instead of 166 votes originally reported by Clerk Hadlock. Furthermore, the hand count uncovered that in the commissioners

race, Wagoner received 2,424 votes instead of 2362, and Ertman received 2,163 votes instead of 2,225 as originally reported by Clerk Hadlock. Exhibit 13, 2024 General Official Election Results, Weston County, https://www.westongov.com/wp-content/uploads/2024/11/Official-Weston-County-2024-General-Election-Summary.pdf.

It was determined through multiple phone calls with the Weston County Clerk's Office, as well as the vendor for Weston County's ballots, Elections Systems and Software (ES&S), that the incident in Weston County was caused by Clerk Hadlock issuing incorrectly formatted ballots to voters on election day. Pursuant to W.S. 22-6-102(a), the county clerk is responsible for the printing of official ballots used in the election. During the process of creating the ballots, errors or omissions resulted in two editions of incorrectly formatted ballots being printed and delivered to Hadlock. A third and final edition of correctly formatted ballots was subsequently printed and delivered.

On election day, the County Clerk's Office mixed all three editions of the ballots and issued them to voters. Because the ES&S tabulators were calibrated specifically for the correctly formatted third-edition ballots, when ballots from the first and second editions were scanned, the tabulators could not "find" the voter's selections for certain races, interpreting them as undervotes. As a result, the ES&S machines were only able to accurately tabulate the third-edition ballots that were fed into them. Clerk Hadlock ultimately admitted to making this mistake.

<u>In Response to Inquiry from Secretary of State's Office, Clerk Hadlock Submits Subsequent Post-Election Audit Results</u>

Despite the Weston County Canvassing Board's confirmation that Clerk Hadlock had made an error with her ballots on November at the Weston County Canvassing Board meeting on November 8, Clerk Hadlock's post-election audit report still showed no errors. Because of this, the Secretary of State's Office contacted Clerk Hadlock via email on Saturday, November 9, 2024, to notify Clerk Hadlock that the office questioned the results of Weston County's post-election audit, given both the Weston County Canvassing Board's hand count, as well as the admissions from Clerk Hadlock that she made an error. Exhibit 14, Email from Deputy Secretary of State Jesse Naiman to Clerk Hadlock, November 9, 2024. Clerk Hadlock did not respond to this email. However, Hadlock submitted a second post-election audit, which identified 21 ballots with a discrepancy. Exhibit 15, Post Election Audit Results for 2024 General Election Reported by Weston County Clerk, Emailed November 12, 2024. The resubmitted post-election audit results confirmed both the errors made by Clerk Hadlock, as well as the incorrect post-election audit results originally filed with the Secretary of State's Office on November 5, 2024. *Id.*

II. Referral in Accordance with W.S. 22-26-121

Clerk Hadlock's conduct leading up to and during the 2024 Primary and General Elections, as described above, contains numerous infractions of the Wyoming Election Code. Specifically, Clerk Hadlock's conduct leading up to, during, and after the General Election, constituted multiple alleged and observed violations of the Wyoming Election Code and Wyoming law.

The submittal of a false post-election audit report on November 6, 2024 does seem to be a willful violation of the code. This audit was performed and filed with the Secretary of State's Office merely one day following the 2024 General Election despite multiple questions about anomalies regarding the unofficial results communicated by myself and our office's staff. When Clerk Hadlock filed her post-election audit report indicating that there were no issues with her ballots, the Weston County Canvassing Board meeting on November 8, 2024, as well as the subsequent, properly-performed audit filed with our office, confirmed that there were 21 of 75 ballots with a discrepancy, in direct conflict to the initial post-election audit results submitted to our office. The second post-election audit results suggest that the first post-election audit was performed in contravention of W.S. 22-6-130 and the procedures set forth by our office. In addition, W.S. 22-26-119 provides:

Violation of the Election Code by an official consists of the willful violation of the Election Code by any official or by any deputy or assistant official, or the willful failure or refusal of any official or assistant to perform an act or duty required of him by the Election Code. Any official, deputy or assistant who commits a violation of the Election Code is guilty of a felony and, in addition to the penalty prescribed by W.S. 22-26-101, is subject to removal from office in a proceeding instituted for that purpose.

Both the timing of the initial post-election audit, as well as the circumstances, indicate this filing could be prosecuted as a willful violation of the Wyoming Election Code.

Clerk Hadlock also appears to have violated W.S. 6-5-308 by when she submitted a false post-election audit report to the Secretary of State's Office. W.S. 6-5-308(a) makes it a felony to file "with the secretary of state and willfully or knowingly: (i) Falsifies, conceals or covers up by any trick, scheme or device a material fact; (ii) Makes any materially false, fictitious or fraudulent statement or representation; or (iii) Makes or uses any false writing or document knowing the same to contain any materially false, fictitious or fraudulent statement or entry."

Clerk Hadlock filed a false document with the Secretary of State when she filed her postelection audit report indicating that there were no issues with her ballots, when in fact the properly-done audit showed there were 21 of 75 ballots with a discrepancy. By doing so, Clerk Hadlock made false representations and may have covered up the fact that her audit contained serious errors, or may not have even conducted the audit at all. Either one of those possible conclusions would mean that she attempted to hide the problems with the conduct of the 2024 General Election.

Clerk Hadlock's conduct during the 2024 Primary Election also constituted multiple admitted violations of the Wyoming Election Code, including the failure to set proper chain of custody procedures in place for sealing voting equipment and ballots, as well as insufficient training and compensation of election judges, in potential violation of W.S. 22-12-101 *et seq.*, 22-6-104, and 22-10-109. Several of these were admitted by Clerk Hadlock in her communications with election judges following the 2024 Primary Election. *See* Ex. 2.

Clerk Hadlock's failure to comply with requirements for logic and accuracy testing, over multiple communications and guidance from our office for both the 2024 Primary Election, and 2024 General Election also demonstrate a failure to comply with W.S. 22-11-104(b).

Therefore, Election Code Complaints 2024-31 and 2024-38, as well as the findings and observations contained herein, are hereby referred for further investigation and prosecution in accordance with W.S. 22-26-121.

III. Removal from Office

Clerk Hadlock's conduct shows a pattern of gross incompetence and even willful neglect of her duties as the chief election officer of Weston County. Through her errors with the 2024 Primary and General Election, Clerk Hadlock has shown a repeated dereliction of her duties as chief election official of Weston County. Her errors in the 2024 Primary and General Elections were numerous, and violated several provisions of the Wyoming Election Code, including those ensuring proper chain of custody of ballots and seals, proper testing of voting equipment and machines, and proper appointment, training, and the administration of the oath to election judges. The printing of ballots and the use of those ballots in an election is a duty of the county clerk, which was done incorrectly by Clerk Hadlock.

Clerk Hadlock has shown a continual inability to communicate with the people of Wyoming and our office. Additionally, her attitude toward the people of Wyoming have also shown a level of incompetence and unprofessionalism unbecoming of a Wyoming election official. And she has shown an inability to learn from mistakes.

Most importantly, we must highlight that Clerk Hadlock's conduct in filing a false post-election audit in contravention to Wyoming law indicates a repeated and heightened level of misconduct. There are only two reasonable explanations for the false submission of this audit. One possibility is that Clerk Hadlock actually conducted the audit, finding errors in the election and then choosing to falsely assert that no errors had been found. The second reasonable possibility is that no audit was conducted at all. That raises the question of whether Clerk Hadlock ever conducted a post-election audit in past elections. Either way, the submission of Clerk Hadlock's post-election audit for the 2024 General Election was clearly false.

The circumstances surrounding the submittal of this false post-election audit report, despite myself communicating to her multiple times the anomalies in the results, leads me to believe that a willful violation of the Wyoming Election Code occurred, in direct violation of W.S. 22-26-119. Clerk Hadlock made false representations and may have covered up the fact that her audit contained serious errors, or may not have even conducted the audit at all to hide the problems with the Weston County election.

I believe the standard of misconduct or malfeasance in office has clearly been met, which should subject her to a removal proceeding in district court pursuant to W.S. 18-3-902. I recommend the Governor direct the Attorney General to commence removal proceedings in district court.

Formal Complaint

to

Office of the Wyoming Secretary of State

As a ballot machine judge and having prior precinct election judge experience I observed inadequacies by the County Clerk in administrating the August 20th, 2024 Primary Election in Weston County, Wyoming. Below is a list of conflicts I observed.

22-12-107 Materials for judges. (a) Before election day the clerk shall cause to be delivered to one (1) of the judges of election in each polling place the following materials:

Precinct judges reported after the polls opened that only Republican Ballots had been delivered to the judges in the bags with the poll books.

22-12-108 Ballots shall be delivered under seal.........Seals shall be broken on the morning of the election day by the chief judge in the presence of the other judges before the polls open.

Bags with poll books and Republican ballots were not sealed upon receipt by the designated Precinct Judges at the Court House the evening before election day. I Osage and Upton judges told me their bags were not sealed either.

- 22-12-110 (i) & 22-12-112the judges shall compare ballots on the voting machines with sample ballots
- 22-12-105judges of election...... shall post elsewhere in the polling place at least one instruction card and one sample ballot.
- 22-6-104..... The officer shall distribute copies of the sample ballot to each polling place prior to opening of the polls. The judges of election shall post at least one (1) copy of the sample in the polling place during the election.

No sample ballots were delivered to the Newcastle poll until requested after the polls had been open for an hour or so. Sample ballots were posted upon receipt.

- 22-12-110..... The key to each machine sealed in an envelope
- 22-10-109. Key in sealed envelope;
- 22-12-112.....Envelopes containing keys shall not be opened if the numbers and records on them do not correspond to the numbers and records on the machine.

I did not observe this process closely as the Head Polling Place Judge was in possession of the envelope. I can attest that the envelope containing seals, keys and Passwords was not sealed.

The judge who was tasked with custody of the machine seals and passwords informed me her bag was not sealed. The judge showed me she stuck the pulled sticker seals on a paper and returned it to the bag.

I observed at start up the seal that was on the thumb drive was not attached to the thumb drive and brought it to the attention of the judge in charge of the keys.

22-8-102judges of election shall be registered electors.

Democratic and Unaffiliated ballots that were <u>not</u> delivered in the poll book bags the previous day. They were delivered late Tuesday morning after the polls had opened by ES&S personnel in an unsealed manilla envelope with sticky notes showing the number of ballots being delivered for each precinct.

22-10-108(a) shall immediately lock and seal the voting machine with a numbered METAL seal and make a record.

Sticker seals do not always VOID when pulled. Wire seals are required by state statute. The Ballot machines are sealed with sticker seals. No record of the seal numbers was made except to stick them on a paper and put them back in the envelope the keys and passwords were in.

22-12-108seals shall be broken on the morning of the election day by chief judge in the presence of other judges before the polls are opened.

No process of validating seals on the ballot bags or the ballot machine was observed on August 20, 2024.

Important issues that contribute to the lack of integrity of our

Weston County Elections

As a long-time election judge, I feel the unprofessional conduct reflects on me and the other dedicated judges. I want our elections to be transparent, secure, honest and fair.

I have been an election judge in Weston County since 2012, working 13 elections. I have been a qualified elector in Weston County since 1982. I take my responsibilities as an election judge and registered voter seriously.

I attended the 1-hour election judge training and was issued a Certified Election Official Certificate. To say I "successfully passed the examination according to standards promulgated by the Secretary of State" is a stretch.

Secretary of State Election Judge Handbooks were not issued to Election Judges.

Wyoming Clerks Assn (Weston County) Election Handbooks were not issued to Election Judges.

Voter Card Tally sheets were not available before voting started.

No HAVA poster was delivered to our poll, even though it was requested. SS302(b) this is listed in the SoS Election Judge Handbook pg 3

Election Certificate to balance the ballots cast per precinct to the ballots handed out by the precinct judges, to record necessary seals and to have an attest to the accuracy of certification needs to be improved. (Certification in front of poll books)

In the Secretary of State Election Judges Handbook it states the Election Judge turns in one poll book and keeps the one. I have talked to judges in several other counties and they were surprised Weston County does not do this. SoS Handbook pg 21

No Emergency Procedure has been offered or discussed. This can be as simple as a printed guideline listing what must be secured, sealed and removed and who is responsible for it in case of emergencies and where the nearest door is. SoS Handbook pg 11

Voters are not always asked to state their name and address aloud, even though signage at our poll directs it. SoS Handbook pg 12

In the past when a voter is verified as a registered voter in the poll book or as a new registration, they are issued a card with a number that corresponds with their number in the

poll book. When the card is shown to the ballot judge the proper ballot is issued. The cards issued for the August 20, 2024 Primary Election did not have this designation on them causing a Republican ballot to be issued to a registered Democrat that was cast. I know this happened once but cannot say it didn't happen more than that.

Deb Piana was appointed to pick up the ballot machine key, passwords and seals the evening before election day. I trust Piana and do not suspect anything nefarious, but she did not know the rules so accepted the unsealed bag containing passwords, keys and seals. This bag seal should have been recorded in such a manner other judges would verify it had not been tampered with.

Nearly half of the Election Judges at the Newcastle Poll had never been judges before and, in my opinion, were inadequately trained.

Three new, first election, judges were assigned to the Registration Desk with no training. Judges were moved around to put one experienced judge at the registration desk and others helped them throughout the day.

One voter was registered in the wrong precinct because they were using the old 8.5×11 map. The mistake was caught and I believe you were called.

Machine Judges in each polling place were instructed to deliver to the Courthouse the machine ballot box laden with the days voted ballots. This was a heavy burden as we are mostly in the grandmother category. Upon delivery to the Courthouse a Weston County Deputy and a person from ES&S unloaded the ballot box, with the machine and thumb drive and took it downstairs in the Courthouse. Why can't the ballots be removed from the box, placed in a locked and sealed box and delivered with the top portion of the machine?

A method of tracking and confirming all seals by election judges at the poll is missing corrupting the chain of custody of the ballots. 22-12-108

Sticker seals on the machines do not always VOID when pulled. Wire seals are required by state statute 22-10-108(a) The sticker on the thumb drive wasn't even stuck to it.

Instructions explaining how to obtain a ballot and prepare it for deposit, how to get a new ballot if one is spoiled etc and sample ballots must be posted in each booth and at least one elsewhere in the polling place. 22-12-104; 22-12-105

I strongly suggest training be in a mock election setting with as many judges as possible attending. I feel like you can attribute most of this list of issues to a lack of knowledge and training. It may help you, help us if you see the entire process.

Two voters who voted in the last election were not registered and had to re-register. This makes for grouchy voters. Do they need to prove residency? Why do they drop off?

Do new registrations need proof of residency and if so where is the rule and what is acceptable?

Is a picture on a phone of a driver's license acceptable in place of the actual license? Someone forgot their license and had their mom send a picture of it.

There was no extra tape for the ballot machine as promised.

We asked for a Voter Registration List to include five Newcastle Poll Precincts only, NOT divided by precinct and not the whole county.

Alphabet tabs in the poll books would be a dream. You said it would be no problem.

I know some of what is listed may seem petty. Some of it is required by state statute, some by the Secretary of State. Some is just to make the process easier for the judges.

I received the test results/precinct summary of your County Clerk's voting systems and am forwarding a copy to you. When you look at the Precinct Summary, there are erroneous test numbers used in almost every race. The errors include:

- 1. Use of same numbers for more than one candidate (including the write-in) in the same race;
- 2. Used zeros for candidates;
- 3. Used zeros for write-ins, so write-ins were not tested;
- 4. Didn't test overvotes:
- 5. Didn't test undervotes;
- 6. Didn't run a blank ballot.
- 7. It is unclear if she tested any Express vote ballot card or ballots from the ballot-on-demand printer.

In terms of numbers and frequency of errors, the Weston County test results are the worst results we have seen of the 19 county's general election test results reviewed so far. Based on these errors, The Wyoming Republican Party is requesting that she retest the voting system/tabulators ASAP. I understand that another Clerk from another county came up to Weston County and helped with the retesting in the primary and I

would recommend she do the same thing for the general. I understand Malcolm Ervin and Julie Freese were willing to do that in the primary.

The party is not interested in embarrassing anyone and we are willing to help Clerks make sure the testing is done properly. I will give you a call in a few minutes to so can discuss where the errors show up and how to fix this.

At that time, you only provided us with the summary report. Therefore, we do not know if a different number of valid votes has been assigned to each candidate, and for or against each measure, as W.S. 22-11-104(b)(iii) requires. But as we have said many times, W.S. 22-11-104(b)(iii) states that a different number of valid votes should be assigned to each candidate, and for or against each measure.

We would encourage any county whose test does not conform to W.S. 22-11-104(b)(iii) to retest their equipment in accordance with Wyoming law.

Good Afternoon Clerk Hadlock:

Both W.S. 22-10-108(a) and W.S. 22-11-104(b)(iii) require the clerk to notify the chairman of each political party before testing voting machines and allow party representatives and representatives of independent candidates to be present at this test. However, these statutes do not place a ceiling on who can attend this test. In fact, Chapter 29, Section 6(e) of the Secretary of State's Election Procedures Rules states:

The County Clerk shall hold a public L&A test of the voting equipment before any ballot tabulation device is used. The County Clerk shall notify in writing, as specified in W.S. 22-10-108, the chairman of each political party and all independent candidates informing them of the date, time, and place for testing the ballot marking and ballot tabulation devices. **Other witnesses may be present.**

Allowing other members of the public to be present is consistent with the letter and the spirit of the law. As this re-test is an extension of the logic and accuracy test you previously conducted, I believe you should allow other members of the public to be present.

Clerk's error results in votes not being counted in legislative race

(UPDATE: Weston County GOP Chair Kari Drost has provided updated results for the House District 1 and Weston County Commission races after the canvassing board met on Friday, November 8, at 10 a.m. at the courthouse to conduct a recount and certify election results. Although the recount did not affect the outcome of either election, there were significant corrections made in tallies for both races and those numbers have been updated at the end of this story. The Weston County Clerk did not provide updated election results to the News Letter Journal, but we were able to verify updated figures provided by Drost and Republican Precinct Committeewoman Susan Love on the Weston County website. County Clerk Becky Hadlock has taken responsibility for an election error that potentially resulted in hundreds of votes not being counted, but her actions before, during and after the election have been inconsistent and raise public concerns over the integrity of Weston County's elections.

By An error has been identified in the manner in which Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock prepared the ballots for the general election, and it resulted in a number of votes not being counted in the initial tallies announced on Tuesday evening.

Hadlock addressed the issue at Thursday's Weston County Commission meeting and took responsibility for the error in an email shared with a number of Wyoming public officials early that morning, but only after being contacted by the county sheriff, the Wyoming Secretary of State and numerous media outlets who expressed concern over what she called a "calculation error."

Weston County Sheriff Bryan Colvard confirmed for the News Letter Journal that he had to contact County Clerk Becky Hadlock on election night regarding an anomaly in the House District 1 race after Wyoming Secretary of State Chuck Gray was unable to reach her. Colvard contacted Hadlock at her home, and Gray later confirmed for Colvard that she had contacted him via a text.

Gray told the NLJ that he had contacted her immediately Tuesday evening to try to address an issue his office detected in the report of election results distributed by Hadlock's office. The vote count in the House District 1 race indicated that Rep. Chip Neiman, R-Hullett, had received only 166 votes in the election and that there were 1,289 undervotes in the race. In comparison, Neiman had received 645 votes in the 2024 primary election, 1,074 in the 2022 General Election and 1,300 in the 2020 General Election.


Representatives of the News Letter Journal had also noted the discrepancy in the vote total provided by Hadlock, and NLJ photojournalist Walter Sprague reached out to Hadlock when the courthouse opened for business on Wednesday morning to seek clarification. Although she admitted later in the afternoon that the issue was under investigation by ES&S (Election Systems & Software), the county's electronic vote tabulator provider, she originally told Sprague that the significant number of undervotes were the result of a "protest" vote over the County Commission's recent resolution declaring vacancies in the state Legislature.

The vacancy resolution was supported by Neiman, and he thought Hadlock's initial claim was preposterous.

"Does no one know how to see a red flag? Something needs to be questioned," he said. "To write it off as some kind of protest vote. ... My goodness, I can't imagine." Neiman told the News Letter Journal that constituents had contacted him to express concerns about Clerk Hadlock moving forward with certifying the false results. "My concern is that I have constituents calling me saying 'I voted for you,' and that their votes haven't been counted," Neiman told the News Letter Journal. "Whether they were for or against me, I want to make sure people have their votes counted."

He said that he was first made aware of the issue when a friend from Buffalo who had seen the results called and asked what he did to upset the voters in Weston County. He said that his friend said something looked "fishy."

Neiman was then contacted by Dan Fouch, an Osage resident, who expressed concern that his vote was not counted because Neiman only received two votes in Osage despite 164 ballots being cast. Fouch reported that he personally knew of more Osage residents who had voted for Neiman.



It is unclear when Hadlock actually accepted that the results she announced were not accurate, but the Wyoming Secretary of State told the News Letter Journal that the error is a direct result of actions taken by Hadlock in preparing for the election.

"The county clerk used incorrect ballots during the election," Gray said in an email. "The printing of ballots and the distribution of the correct ballots is a duty of the county clerk, which was done incorrectly by Clerk Hadlock."

The state official also confirmed that Hadlock had been informed that there was an issue with the vote count prior to her telling the NLJ that the tally was legitimate on Wednesday morning.

"I immediately contacted the county clerk on Tuesday evening when it became known, as well as the County Clerks' Association of Wyoming and the Attorney General's Office," Gray said, expressing dismay over the performance of the Weston County Clerk.

"I'm deeply troubled by the actions of Clerk Hadlock," he stated in the email.

Citizens reported at Thursday's commission meeting that concerns had already existed over Hadlock's handling of the election, and Weston County Republican Party Chairwoman Kari Drost testified at the meeting that the error in the tabulation of the House District 1 race was the direct result of a string of deficiencies.

In an email Drost sent to the News Letter Journal on October 27 in response to the newspaper's concerns over Hadlock's election performance and reporting, she had already expressed fear that the county clerk's behavior would damage the integrity of the upcoming election.

"When the machines were tested before the primary, Becky (Hadlock) failed and had to re-test. I asked her to test early for the general election so that there would be time to re-test," she told the News Letter Journal. She noted that she was given "a million" excuses on why Hadlock could not perform a re-test.

Drost was eventually informed — on the morning of the last possible day that a re-test could be conducted — that Hadlock had consented to hold the re-test, but no opportunity was given to provide notice to the general public. Drost said she asked Hadlock what she would do if the machines failed because there was no time to re-test again, and Hadlock brushed off the concern with an assurance that the machines would not fail.

"Well, guess what? She failed. The attorney for the WRP (Wyoming Republican Party) Brian Shuck told me that the precinct results were an 'epic' fail ..., probably the worst fail he has seen in any county. Brian called Michael Stulken (Weston County Attorney) and told him of the failure and asked Michael what he wanted to do and offered his (Brian's) help to do a good test of the machines," Drost told the News Letter Journal in an email on October 27. "Brian called twice on Friday and left a message and has not received a call back yet."



She then questioned whether or not she should query Hadlock and raise concerns about the machines prior to the election.

"If I call out her incompetence, then the voters may not trust the election results and may think their vote does not matter. But it does matter," Drost said in the email. She noted that everyone's vote matters and that, because of the concerns, she had reservations about trusting election results reported from Weston County. Her worst fear ended up coming true, she said, at least in one race.

Those fears are shared by state officials, however, and because of the anomaly, Gray said that he is "insisting the county canvassing board undertake a review of the ballots to determine accurate counts prior to certification of official results to our office."

He noted that the notice of the canvassing board meeting should be published and the meeting should be open to the public.

On Thursday morning, during the Board of Weston County Commissioners meeting, Hadlock assured the commissioners and members of the public who attended that the results would not be certified until the investigation is complete.

She also reported that the canvassing board is tentatively scheduled to meet Friday at 2 p.m. in the commissioners' room at the Weston County Courthouse, but later in the afternoon informed Weston County GOP Chair Kari Drost that the canvassing board will meet on Friday, November 8, at 10 a.m. at the courthouse to certify election results

When the ballots were counted again at that time it was determined that the vote counts in the Weston County Commission race were also wrong, and recounts were conducted for that race in addition to the one that was held for House District 1.

After the recount, the number of votes cast for Chip Neiman in the House District 1 race increased from 166 to 1,268 and the number of write-ins increased from 8 to 29. The undervotes went from the 1,289 first reported by Hadlock on election night to 166 after the recount.

The change in vote tallies were not as significant in the county commission race, but Commissioner Ed Wagoner's total increased by 62 votes, from 2,362 to 2,424 and Matry Ertman's tally dropped 62 votes, from 2,225 to 2,163. Both were elected as they were running unopposed for two available seats.

I am the Chair of the Weston County Republican Party and had previously sent a letter to Clerk Becky Hadlock with the Poll Watching schedule. I was never informed by the Clerk that I had any other role than the Poll Watcher role I had assigned to myself. Present in the room for the counting of ballots were myself, Bill Fuller, who I was told was the Democrat representative, Clerk Hadlock, and 2 employees of the Clerk's office. I fulfilled my duties as a Poll Watcher that day. On November 8, 2024, I attended the Canvassing Board meeting to certify the election in Weston County. At this meeting, a member of the public asked a question and Clerk Hadlock remarked that every poll location had at least one Democrat and at least one Republican. I interjected that no Republican Election Judge was at the counting of absentee/early voting at the Courthouse. Clerk Hadlock informed me at that point that I was the Republican representative. WY Statute states political party representation must be equal. If I was an election judge, than Clerk Hadlock was in violation of election law because she did not administer the oath of office to me. If I was not an election judge, than representation of political parties was unequal because the Democrats had an election judge present and the Republicans did not. In the Canvassing Board meeting on 11/8/24, Bill Fuller, the Democrat representative signed a voucher provided by Clerk Hadlock that paid him for mileage and 3+ hours of work for being an election judge on 11/5/24. The post-election audit as prescribed by W.S. 22-6-130, Post-election ballot audit, requires that you audit a sample size of 300 contests which correlates to a total of 75 ballots to be audited. The race for U.S. Senate was the contest yielding the smallest observable percentage of difference at 77.95%. The post-election audit formula developed by the University of Wyoming stipulates a maximum percentage difference of 7.5% to be entered into the formula in order to produce a statistically significant sample size. Entering 7.5% into the formula yields a sample size of 300 contests, equating to 75 ballots.

Please see the attached spreadsheet with the 75 randomly selected ballots to be used in your post-election audit. Please complete Column 'B' in the second tab of the spreadsheet. You are auditing the three statewide contests and at least the first state legislative contest on each ballot. Refer to the audit procedure document for more details.

Governor's Decision Regarding Request to Remove Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock



DECISION REGARDING REQUEST TO REMOVE WESTON COUNTY CLERK BECKY HADLOCK

I. Basis for Complaint Against Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock

On December 23, 2024, I received a verified complaint from nine qualified electors of Weston County seeking removal of Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock for misconduct and/or malfeasance in office. I received an additional verified complaint from a qualified elector with the same allegations on January 10, 2025. These complaints were filed in compliance with Wyo. Stat. Ann. § 18-3-902, which provides as follows:

[w]henever it appears to the governor on the verified complaint of qualified electors... that any county officer is guilty of misconduct or malfeasance in office he may direct the attorney general to commence and prosecute an action in the district court... asking for the removal of the officer.

Copies of these complaints are attached.

II. Review of Statutory and Other Legal Requirements

To determine whether "it appears to" me, as required by the statute, that misconduct or malfeasance occurred, Wyoming statutes and associated case law do not provide exact definitions, though they do lay out general guidelines. Of primary importance is the legal character of my determination. Wyoming Statute § 18-3-902(a) treats my recommendation of removal as an act of prosecutorial discretion, in line with the authority of the Executive Branch to enforce the law. *Sheridan County Republican Party v. Haswell et al.*, CV 2024-10, ¶¶ 47-48 (Wyo. Dist. Ct. 2024). A governor's determination is not a court order or a judicial finding of fact. While I may recommend that the Attorney General file a petition in district court seeking removal, I cannot unilaterally remove an official. Removal would only occur if the district court, after a legal proceeding, upheld my recommendation.

In exercising prosecutorial discretion, two factors weigh heavily on my analysis: (1) the legal threshold required to constitute "misconduct" or "malfeasance," and (2) the serious nature of recommending the removal of a lawfully elected county official.

First, while there are many discussions in many sources as to what constitutes "misconduct" or "malfeasance," I thought it best to look to Wyoming law to understand the meaning of those terms. In 1926, the Wyoming Supreme Court reviewed the decision of a district court denying the recommendation of the Governor to remove a county commissioner. In that decision, the Supreme Court states that the misconduct or malfeasance necessary for removal under the statute refers to "neglect [which] should be such as to involve a willful design, or indicate an habitual

inattention to public business." *State v. Scott*, 247 P. 699, 721 (Wyo. 1926). Furthermore, the decision explained that "[n]ot every technical violation of a statute or of official duty will justify the summary removal of an officer." *Id.* General incompetence does not rise to the level of misconduct or malfeasance. *Id.* at 714. Therefore, I have reviewed the complaint and the information provided with the understanding that "misconduct" and "malfeasance" require some form of intent or willful act by Clerk Hadlock that goes beyond incompetence or a failure to attend to the business of her office aptly. Moreover, motive is a key determiner when assessing intent or "will." Motive is distinguished from impulse or inattentiveness because it implies a reason for doing something or desire to bring about a result.

Turning to the scope of my investigation, the complaints submitted against Clerk Hadlock detailed several allegations of misconduct or malfeasance spanning the 2020, 2022, and 2024 election cycles. These allegations were considered carefully and are the subject of this memorandum. The Wyoming Supreme Court has declared that, as a general rule, county officials are only subject to a recommendation of removal for acts committed during the term to which they are currently elected, stating, "it seems the weight of authority denies the removal for acts committed in a prior term." *Scott*, 247 P. at 716. However, *Scott* also provides two exceptions to this rule: (1) "an offense of immoral conduct committed by a re-elected incumbent after the election and before qualifying for the new term," and (2) acts committed during a prior term that show "intent, motive, or a general manner of procedure or otherwise illustrating the point in issue or corroborating other evidence relating..." to allegations concerning a present term. *Id.* at 717. As a result, my analysis of the verified complaints will focus on allegations concerning Clerk Hadlock's current term of office, though acts committed before then may be relevant to corroborating current events.

Second, the purpose of Wyo. Stat. Ann. § 18-3-902 is not to confer supervisory or disciplinary authority over county officers upon the Governor; instead, the statute provides a legal mechanism to recommend the removal of a lawfully elected county official, if necessary to protect the public. See id. at 709 ("The object of the prosecution is not to exact a penalty or impose a punishment, but to relieve the public of an officer believed to be unfit to further perform the duties of the office"). This procedure and responsibility, in my view, should be considered only as an extreme measure, as replacing the will of the electorate with the opinions of a few contravenes the spirit of our constitutional republic and comes close to violating the letter of the Wyoming and United States' Constitutions. Thus, I am obliged to consider any recommendation to remove a duly elected county official somberly, and believe the bar of removal to be quite high. Accordingly, such an action must be thoroughly reviewed because it could result in the functional disenfranchisement of a local electorate by one statewide official - the Governor. I believe this course of action must be a remedy of last resort, justified only by substantial actions that directly harm the county or citizens.

I hold the highest respect for the qualified voters' right to vote for legally eligible candidates. The election of a county officer is, after all, a local election, not an appointment made by a statewide official or body. Elections are a cornerstone of our republic and the results must never be casually set aside. Moreover, the process in Wyoming to replace a vacant elected office between

elections is not a special election but a selection process by party officials and county commissioners; *ipso facto* substituting the county-wide electorate's will with that of the county party central committee. The latter is comprised of a select subset of the county electorate. In my opinion, to justify overruling the will of the people with the will of a small subgroup of voters, an elected candidate's actions must harm the public to such an extent that removal is necessary to protect the county.

III. Details of Complaint

As my review is limited to the allegations in the verified complaint, focusing on allegations of conduct occurring during her current term of office, I begin my analysis with a summary of those allegations. During 2024, complainants allege that Clerk Hadlock committed the following acts of misconduct or malfeasance: (1) mishandling election ballots by ordering and using multiple ballot versions in the general election, (2) improperly testing voting machines during the primary and general elections, (3) using incorrect ballots in the general election, which necessitated handrecounts, and (4) causing an undercount of 1289 votes. These acts were not denied by Clerk Hadlock.

Since allegations one, three, and four from the 2024 election are closely related, I will address them together. Due to (1) the fact that there are different elections for different precincts and (2) the requirement to rotate candidate names on the ballot under Wyo. Stat. Ann. §§ 22-6-121 through -122, different versions of the ballot must be sent to the different voting locations. According to interviews and submitted written materials, it is clear that multiple ballot versions were distributed to polling stations during the 2024 general election as required. However, some of the ballots distributed were incorrect. Specifically, there appear to have been two different ballot versions, which had errors. One ballot failed to properly rotate candidate names between precincts as required by law and the other incorrectly omitted a line of information indicating the term of the office.

According to Clerk Hadlock, the multiple ballot versions were the result of mistakes that occurred during the ballot formatting and editing process. To be clear, Wyoming counties have a variety of options to produce final ballots and, if elections are to be trusted, the County Clerk must check, edit, and confirm final ballots before they are ultimately distributed. Each approach requires a procedure to assure secure distribution to polling locations.

¹ To aid in my review of the complaint, I invited several people to be interviewed. These interviews included Clerk Hadlock and Deputy Clerk Amber Green, two representatives from the complainants who served as election judges, two candidates whose races were impacted, a member of the Weston County Canvassing Board and a county clerk from another county to provide background and context. Some individuals provided written statements and/or documents in lieu of, or in addition to, an interview. I received written statements and/or materials from the Secretary of State, the two complainants whom I interviewed, three additional complainants, and a member of the Weston County Canvassing Board, who also served as an election judge. Some individuals refused or did not respond to my request. The information provided in these interviews and statements revealed that there is no dispute as to the facts.

Weston County contracts with Election Systems & Software ("ES&S") for the printing and formatting of ballots, as well as voting machine programming, among other election administration tasks. When drafting ballots for an election, Weston County receives a draft ballot proof from ES&S by email, which they then review for errors. ES&S will also use this ballot proof in generating the programming for voting machines, coding how the machine will read each ballot based on the expected placement of "bubbles" on the sheet. If these "bubbles" do not correspond to the correct location on the ballot, or are otherwise mismatched with incorrect names, errors are likely to occur. Thus, proofing and testing representative ballots is of the utmost importance for accurate tabulation. Assuming no errors are found, the Clerk will confirm with ES&S that the ballot is correct, also ordering a total number of printed ballots based on the estimated need for the upcoming election. After confirming and ordering the ballots, sealed bundles of ballots began to arrive at Clerk Hadlock's office by mail over the following weeks.

In the instance of the 2024 General Election, Clerk Hadlock first indicated that the ballot proof sent by ES&S was correct. However, sometime after Clerk Hadlock indicated that the ballot proof was correct, ES&S noticed that the spacing of the section of the ballot for the House District #1 race was incorrect due to the lack of language stating that the office was for a two year term. The candidate for House District #1 was unopposed. Consequently, the candidate's name and corresponding "bubble" were placed one space too high on the ballot, making them inconsistent with the voting machines' programming. This variance yielded incorrect results from machines used to tabulate the incorrect ballots. Upon acknowledging this error to ES&S over email, Clerk Hadlock certified that a corrected ballot proof was ready for printing, again ordering the amount of corrected ballots necessary to conduct the general election. Again, sealed batches of these corrected ballots began to arrive at Clerk Hadlock's office by mail over the following weeks. These ballots were then stored in a secure location. None of these factors are necessarily out of the ordinary. The precision required to assure correct results often requires multiple reviews and redrafts. Other districts across the state have similarly conducted such reviews and redrafts.

While it remains unclear how different ballot versions, some correct and some incorrect, arrived at different polling places, it is clear that different batches were sent out. Upon receipt of sealed ballot batches in the mail, the Weston County Clerk's office stores them in a locked vault within the office, and they do not unseal the ballots until Election Day. It may be that some ballots from the first mailed batches that were known to be incorrect were inadvertently mixed with ballots from the second batch in the vault, resulting in incorrect ballot versions being sent out to polling places along with correct ballot versions. If so, this circumstance would constitute an error in procedure.

Unbeknownst to, and unnoticed by, both ES&S and Clerk Hadlock, there was one additional error within the corrected ballots she received. As noted previously, Wyo. Stat. Ann. §§ 22-6-121 through -122 requires the rotation of candidate names on certain ballots going to certain polling locations. In this case, the two Republican candidates for the Weston County Commission were listed on the ballot; however, their names were not rotated as required and thus mismatched what had been programmed into the voting machines. Although both

candidates appeared on ballots, their names were not rotated as anticipated and as the machines were programmed to do. As a result, in some instances the machines incorrectly attributed the marked "bubbles" corresponding to a candidate, causing incorrect results. It was not until after Election Day passed, and the prior incorrect ballots had been found, that anyone noticed this additional error in the results. These errors were accounted for and corrected in the normal course of canvassing after the election.

Complainants' second allegation for 2024 concerns the testing of voting machines prior to the 2024 primary and general elections. Under Wyo. Stat. Ann. §§ 22-10-108 and 22-11-104, county clerks must perform certain voting machine tests in the presence of party representatives two weeks prior to the primary and general elections. County clerks test voting machines by using a test deck. Practice can vary here, with some clerks creating their own, and others using samples provided by ES&S. By and large, programming is provided by ES&S. In all instances, clerks must run the test deck through the machine and compare the results with an expected result matrix until a clean ballot count with zero errors results. This process is observed by representatives of the major parties in the county who, along with the clerk, sign a certification of the inspection that is then sent to the Secretary of State.

In this case, it appears that the necessary machine test for the general election was performed in the presence of both Republican and Democratic Party representatives. When Clerk Hadlock prepared the machines for the test, she gathered the needed materials and programmed the voting machines with an encrypted thumb drive provided by ES&S. However, in gathering the needed materials, she was not able to find the test deck of sample ballots that accompanied the result matrix, also sent by ES&S. As a workaround, she manually filled out her own test deck to match the ES&S matrix, using these manually drafted ballots to run through the voting machines until an errorless count was achieved.² Of note, since the pre-prepared test deck likely was based on the final corrected ballot version, and likely didn't rotate candidate names since it was not based on multiple precincts, it is possible that the machine test would not have detected the previously described ballot errors. Clerk Hadlock testified that she later found the ES&S test deck, which had been placed in a stack behind a blank ballot that she did not discover until a later date.

There was also an allegation, though not included in the electors' verified complaint but mentioned in their interviews, that an ES&S employee conveyed ballots to polling locations allegedly breaking a chain of custody. Election night across Wyoming is generally a busy time. When necessary, ES&S employees have on occasion shuttled ballots elsewhere in the state, and there does not appear to be a clear prohibition to the practice. ES&S employees are often on sight to troubleshoot, advise, and correct issues with their machines, if necessary. As a contractor of the county clerk, they are also charged with conducting an accurate election and are not anxious to sully the reputation of the company for which they work or the county clerk that hired them.

² This is not out of the ordinary and in fact public testimony given during the 2024 Primary State Wide Canvassing board meeting included a recommendation that the machines be tested with ballots that were not always machine generated.

While complainants did allege other instances of misconduct or malfeasance regarding the 2022 and 2020 elections, these incidents occurred prior to Clerk Hadlock's reelection, and, I assume, were knowable to the voting public prior to her re-election. Therefore, as described above, I am focusing my review on the allegations related to her current term, which were documented and corroborated.

I will note that the interviews and written materials were interspersed with comments that Clerk Hadlock failed to provide sufficient training for election judges and poll workers. It is my understanding that the county clerks themselves do not have any uniform or standard training. In addition, some complainants stated that Clerk Hadlock was rude and condescending. While I do not condone arrogant behavior, I do not consider it an act of misconduct or malfeasance. For these reasons, and since these allegations were not included in the verified complaints, I did not consider them in my decision.

In addition, I note that in Clerk Hadlock's interview she was not as forthcoming as I would have liked for her to be. But when confronted directly about issues and problems raised by the complainants, she did not deny the matters. It was disappointing that she did not appear to understand the significance of her mistakes but, again, her interview did not reveal any intent or willfulness on her part.

IV.Analysis

My decision here is not an easy one as there were multiple mistakes committed by Clerk Hadlock and her staff. But as I considered the complaints against Clerk Hadlock outlining numerous errors, some significant, there were three things that tilted the scales against directing the Attorney General to prosecute her removal:

1. Malicious Intent: No information or evidence was provided during the interviews or in the written materials submitted that supported any malicious intent on the part of Clerk Hadlock. No sustainable claims were made that Clerk Hadlock was trying to manipulate the results of the election, which would be an improper purpose. Clearly, Clerk Hadlock's work and that of some of her staff was sloppy and failed to pay sufficient attention to the details necessary to ensure that there were no mistakes in the election process or that the initial results were accurate. As discussed above, one of the key elements to determining malfeasance is motive or willfulness, but in this incidence there is no indication that she did so with any intent to change or nullify the results of the votes of the people of Weston County. On the contrary, despite the number of errors, there was no difference in the ultimate results of the election – only the reported tallies for each candidate. In addition, the fact that she attempted to test the equipment and proof and deliver the ballots properly demonstrates that she was attentive though perhaps perfunctory to her job duties and responsibilities. Thus, she did not demonstrate an "habitual inattention to public business." Unfortunately, her actions included mistakes that resulted in election results that had to be reviewed prior to certification by the Canvassing Board, though one could argue the Canvass is conducted, as it is to assure proper results as it demonstrated here. Finally, since I found no misconduct or malfeasance by Clerk Hadlock in her current

term, there was a diminished purpose in considering her actions in her prior term for corroborating purposes. Regardless, I will note that I did not find any malicious motive or ill intent in the mistakes she made in her prior term either from the evidence supplied in the course of this investigation.

- 2. Canvassing Board: Elections are important and the proper final vote tallies must be methodically confirmed because they are critical. Our election laws acknowledge that errors can happen and thus contemplate a process for careful review of results to identify and correct any errors or mistakes. Canvassing boards are variously constituted to assure that proper accountings are reported and this process occurs over several days following the election to make sure preliminary numbers are correct and properly reported. In the case of the 2024 Weston County General Election, the errors outlined above were identified, and the process worked. Ballots were hand counted as allowed by Wyoming law. It is clear that Clerk Hadlock made many mistakes and exhibited a high degree of unprofessional and perhaps slipshod management of the election. Nonetheless, the Weston County Canvassing Board acted in accordance with its duties and reported corrected numbers on the timeline provided for in state law. There could be little doubt that these mistakes failed to change the affected races as one of the candidates was running unopposed and the other two candidates whose votes were miscounted were the only individuals on the ballot for the two county commissioner positions and so they were effectively running unopposed as well. Still, the system set up to discover, correct, and properly count votes worked here and as there are no complaints lodged against the conduct of the Weston County Canvassing Board, I have every certainty that the results certified by the County Canvassing Board are correct.
- 3. Elected Official: And last, but not least, Clerk Hadlock is an elected official in her own right. For me to override the decision of the people of Weston County and direct the Attorney General to proceed with an action to remove her from office, I must believe that her actions clearly rise to the level of misconduct or malfeasance. Certainly, Clerk Hadlock's actions would constitute simple negligence but we must account for the fact that people will make mistakes. I do not believe, however, that her actions rise to the level of gross negligence nor "willful negligence" as stated by the Secretary of State. Gross negligence requires that a person is indifferent and has little regard for the results of his or her action. Clerk Hadlock was not indifferent – incompetent perhaps – but certainly not indifferent. She tried to conduct the election properly. Unfortunately, she was poorly equipped and trained to perform the duties of her job and she failed to pay attention to detail and plan her schedule to meet the necessary requirements. "Willful negligence" is a step further and involves intentionally not acting even when a person is aware that their actions will cause injury or damage. As already stated, I cannot confirm any nefarious intent on the part of Clerk Hadlock to injure the electors of Weston County by manipulating the election results. Such an effort would have been pointless, as we have established. Thus, her actions do not appear to me to rise to the level of "willful negligence" either.

V. Decision

In light of the information provided and the legal standards necessary for the removal of a county officer, I will not direct the Attorney General to commence an action to remove Weston County Clerk Becky Hadlock. The Attorney General would, in any event, be required to evaluate this case under the full light of due process and pertinent law and would have to make a clear finding of whether Clerk Hadlock committed misconduct or malfeasance. Although I recognize that Clerk Hadlock made many serious mistakes in the 2024 Weston County elections, her actions do not rise to the level of misconduct or malfeasance, as I understand the meaning of those terms in this situation. I do not believe there is a clear path to proving guilt.

The people of Weston County elected Clerk Hadlock with an understanding of the problems she encountered in her prior term. The sanctity of our elections is of utmost importance and the decisions of voters should not be casually cast aside in favor of a process in which only a few participate in putting forth the nomination to replace a removed officer without overwhelming and compelling evidence of misconduct or malfeasance. The decision of who should fill a county office is best made by the people of Weston County in the next election just a little over a year away. Preempting that privilege without a clear and obvious showing of willfulness or intentional acts rising to the level of misconduct or malfeasance is not justifiable. Such a showing has not been made in this case.
